

President's Message

f it's December, then it's almost time for the Club's December 16 Composer's Concert and Holiday Party. Composers' Group concerts are always a fascinating chance to hear what members produce and to appreciate the talent in our organization. The December 16 concert will include "Conversations with Virginia Woolf" by Composer Group Co-Chair Leslie Bennett; piano works by Stephen Schwarz; "Songs of Love and Life" by Sharon Guertin Shafer; "First Subatomic Suite" (from Carnival of the Subatomic Particles) by Mark Simon; and "Russian Winter," by Emmanuel Dubois. The last piece will have its premier the week before at Carnegie Hall by soprano (and Club member) Yulia Petrachuk and harpist Jacqueline Pollauf, who also will be performing the work for us. Please put this event on your calendar – a chance to hear interesting new music and join other Club members for lunch and a celebration of the season.

Now let me give you an update on the ongoing name change issue. Just to review, you may recall that a survey was conducted last spring to get a sense of members' attitudes regarding the Club's name. The survey was prepared with the assistance of a volunteer provided through CultureCapital who has extensive experience with organization name changes. The response rate to the survey was a little over 18 percent. The responses were fairly evenly split between "change" and "no change," with a considerable number whose answers could only be categorized as "undecided." Moreover, the response rate, which was somewhat lower than



anticipated, seemed to suggest that many members do not feel that the question is particularly important.

The survey, of course, told us nothing about how non-Club members view the Club's name and the value and extent of the Club's "name recognition." It also did not tell us whether the name - which we must admit does not at all accurately describe what the Club does -- has a negative impact on new member recruitment or audience size. This last question is, of course, why the Board undertook the review in the first place. At this point, we anticipate having one more meeting with our CultureCapital volunteer to include an informal "focus group" with other members of her firm. The purpose is to review a number of suggestions for names that might better convey who we are as

an organization. We think it is important to take full advantage of this opportunity to get input from an outside independent expert. We are also seeking legal advice about the technical requirements, should we decide to change the Club's name, so that we will be fully informed about the financial and legal impact. Following this, the Board will deliberate further and we will provide you with an update. This is a very complex matter and I am more than happy to hear any further thoughts from members. Please feel free to email me at fmmc@fmmc.org or, better yet, come to the December 16 Holiday Party and we can talk about it!

One last item: I expect that the Board will give final approval at its December 16 meeting for a proposed amendment to the Club's bylaws to add the Avanti Manager and Chorale Chair as voting members of the Board. This organization never stands still!

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

Paul Bowles, Complete Piano Works, The Invencia Piano Duo, Naxos American Classics Series

merican composer and writer Paul Bowles (*b*.1910 *d*. 1999) spent over 50 years as an expatriate in Morocco, becoming famous for his dark novel, The Sheltering Sky. However, prior to leaving the US he had a career as a composer. Now, the complete piano music of Bowles has been released on two separate CDs as part of the Naxos American Classics series.

Two Russian-trained pianists, Andrey Kasparov and Oksana Lutsyshyn, offer sparkling readings of Bowles' music. Bowles was a miniaturist in his piano music, even in his multi-movement works. The musical language is modernistic but accessible. It is concise and lucid with clear lines revealing the influence of his mentor, Aaron Copland. The music draws from American folk, jazz, and Latin American idioms.

The two CDs offer music for both solo and duo piano. The works on the first CD include Latin American dances and musical portraits. There is a set of seven Folk Preludes based on American folk themes and a set of six Preludes in a more abstract style. In addition, there is a short stand-alone piece, "Cornelia Askew at the Garden," three arrangements of works composed for orchestra, and three arrangements of songs. Short musical tributes to Bowles by Leonard Bernstein and Virgil Thomson also are included and capture the man's dapper elegance and insouciance. The only large work on the program, the modernistic sonata for two pianos, includes two short, fast, percussive outer movements that surround a much longer, meditative slow movement.

The second CD includes the free-flowing "Night Waltz" for two pianos. It also includes a piano arrangement of the song cycle Blue Mountain Ballads, a set of five songs Bowles wrote in 1946 to poems by Tennessee Williams. Other works on this CD include two highly compressed sonatinas, a set of Latin American-influenced miniatures, and a boisterous work, the "Turkey Trot," for piano, four-hands.

Pianists in the Friday Morning Music Club may be moved to learn and play some of Bowles' piano works. He was a gifted eccentric whose music is both individualistic and very American. 🗭
