2018 Johansen International Competition Judges

e are excited about the distinguished judges who have agreed to participate in the 2018 Johansen International Competition, taking place March 14-17. Below are highlights of their biographies, as well as a few thoughts from them about competitions.

Violinist Chee-Yun, a native of Seoul, gave her first public performance at age 8. She won the Young Concert Artists International Auditions in 1989, and since then she has performed regularly with the world's foremost orchestras. A gifted recitalist, Chee-Yun has performed in all the major US cities, including appearances at the Kennedy Center, the Mostly Mozart Festival's tour to Japan, a performance with Michael Tilson Thomas in the inaugural season of Carnegie Hall's Zankel Hall, and the US premiere of the Penderecki Sonata No. 2 with pianist Barry Douglas. Chee-Yun's seven discs on the Denon label and one on the Naxos label have received exceptional acclaim, and she has been heard frequently on NPR's Performance Today and on WQXR and WNYC radio in New York City.

Violist Timothy Deighton has concertized throughout the Americas, Europe, Asia, and Australasia and has received several awards for his work, including the American Viola Society's 2016 Maurice W. Riley Award, "in recognition of outstanding contributions to studio teaching and enduring commitment to expanding the viola repertoire through commissions, performance, and recording." He performs regularly with the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra and has collaborated with the American String Quartet and the New Zealand String Quartet and with musicians outside the traditional classical field. He has performed premieres of more than 50 new works for viola, most of which were commissioned by or written for him, and recorded a solo CD, Viola Aotearoa, featuring music for viola by New Zealand

composers. He is currently Professor of Viola at Penn State University. His articles have appeared in many of the best-known string instrument periodicals, and his former students hold positions in professional orchestras and on the faculties of music schools in the United States and overseas.

Cellist Peter Stumpf is professor at the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music. He holds a bachelor's degree

from the Curtis Institute of Music and an artist's diploma from the New England Conservatory. He served as associate principal cellist of the Philadelphia Orchestra for 12 years and principal cellist of the Los Angeles Philharmonic for 9 years. His awards include first prizes in the Washington International Competition, the Graham-Stahl Competition, and the Aspen Concerto Competition. In addition to being cellist of the Johannes String Quartet and the Weiss-Kaplan-Stumpf Trio, he has appeared with pianists Leif Ove Andsnes, Emmanuel Ax, Jorge Bolet,

Yefim Bronfman, Radu Lupu, Wolfgang Sawallisch, Andras Schiff, and Jean Yves Thibaudet, and with the Emerson and Guarneri String Quartets. He also has performed as soloist with orchestras and in venues across the United States. In addition to his current position at IU, he has served on the cello faculty of the Hartt School of Music at the University of Hartford, the New England Conservatory, the University of Southern California, and as guest artist faculty at the Curtis Institute of Music.

Avanti Orchestra Concert Highlights

A vanti Orchestra, conducted by Pablo Saelzer, held its second concert of the season on November 19 at the Cultural Arts Center Montgomery College in Silver Spring, MD. Pianist Yi-Yang Chen, 2017 Washington International Competition winner, performed Tchaikovsky's Piano Concerto No. 1 in B-flat minor to a standing room only audience. Mr. Chen returned to the stage after a standing ovation to play Earl Wild's Etude No. 4 based on George Gershwin's "Embraceable You" as the encore. The concert concluded with Avanti's performance of Dvořák's Symphony No. 6 in D major.

The Sunday afternoon concert drew a full house, which kept our front-of-house

volunteers Tae Kwak, Leslie Luxemburg, and Anne Ukata very busy and deserving of our special thanks and gratitude.

Avanti's next concert on Friday, March 9, will be in celebration of the orchestra's 75th year. Metropolitan Opera Baritone Javier Arrey will perform Mahler's *Lieder eines fahrenden Gesellen* (Songs of a Wayfarer). Also on the program are Schubert's Unfinished Symphony and Strauss' *Aus Italien* Op. 16, movements 1 & 2. The concert will be held at Schlesinger Concert Hall, 4915 East Campus Drive, Alexandria, VA.

I asked our judges for a few of their thoughts on competitions. (Because of his schedule, Peter Stumpf was unavailable to respond.)

What do you think are the benefits of competitions for young people?

Chee-Yun: Competitions can be beneficial to young people as they can inspire them to work hard toward a tangible goal. They also provide an opportunity to learn one's strengths and weaknesses, which will help with their musical growth.

Timothy Deighton: They provide a specific set of challenges, which require careful preparation and a particular focus and attention to detail that may or may not necessarily be the same as those one might encounter when preparing for other performances. While it can be helpful to gauge oneself against others, I believe competitions are most useful when the "competitive" component is self-directed.

What was your most significant competition experience?

Chee-Yun: My most significant competition experience was the 1989 Young Concert Artists International Auditions. In preparation of it, I learned the importance of music in my life and how much sacrifice, dedication, and discipline it'd take to be a musician.

Timothy Deighton: The Emerson String Quartet chamber music competition at the Hartt School. It resulted in rehearsals with the group and a public concert, and was an excellent musical, educational, and confidence-building experience.

What one piece of advice would you give to an aspiring string player?

Chee-Yun: It is kind of difficult to narrow it down to one piece of advice, but may I say, be generous in expressing your love of music.

Timothy Deighton: Recognize that in today's musical world you must have a wide set of skills. It's not enough to just play solo repertoire well; you have to be a flexible musician. It also helps to be organized, have good people skills, and treat your colleagues well. Be honest with yourself about any weaknesses you might have as a musician and work on them, while making the most of your strengths.


Chorale Hard at Work Preparing for its January Concerts
