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# From the Foundation Director

As we prepare for our flurry of upcoming competitions, one of the most exciting challenges is always finding our principal judges. While all of the competition judges are well known and in most cases world-famous musicians, I decided to focus here on the Johansen International Competition judges. The JIC will be occurring in March, a few months in advance of the WIC. Our string judging panels are always composed of one specialist for each of the included instruments, though the selection of the award winners is always a collaborative effort.

Violinist Chee-Yun maintains an active performance and recording schedule, performing regularly with the world's foremost orchestras and as a recitalist in many major US cities. She is also deeply involved in teaching and gives master classes around the world. She has held several teaching posts at notable music schools and universities, including serving as the resident Starling Soloist and Adjunct Professor of Violin at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, Visiting Professor of Music (Violin) at the Indiana University School of Music, and Artist-in-Residence and Professor of Violin at Southern Methodist University in Dallas.

Timothy Deighton is Professor of Viola at Penn State University and has received several awards for outstanding teaching. His articles have appeared in numerous music journals. He has performed premieres of more than fifty new works for viola, most of which were commissioned by, or written for, him. He has also released a solo CD featuring music by New Zealand composers. He has performed with the contemporary music duo the Irrelevants, the Chihara Trio, the American String Quartet, Quartet Accorda, the New Zealand String Quartet, the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra, and the Boston-based chamber orchestra A Far Cry.

Peter Stumpf is currently Professor of Cello at the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music and also has served on the cello faculty of the University of Southern California, Hartt School of Music at the University of Hartford, and the New England Conservatory, and has been a guest artist faculty member at the Curtis Institute of Music. He has served as Principal Cellist



of the Los Angeles Philharmonic and Associate Principal Cellist of the Philadelphia Orchestra. He has performed with pianists Mitsuko Uchida, Leif Ove Andsnes, Emmanuel Ax, Jorge Bolet, Yefim Bronfman, Radu Lupu, Wolfgang Sawallisch, Andras Schiff, and Jean Yves Thibaudet, with the Emerson and Guarneri String Quartets and in concerto appearances with many orchestras, including the Boston Symphony, the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, and the Boston Philharmonic.

Our exciting Composition Competition judges are Kevin Puts from Peabody, Christopher Theofandis from Yale, and composer Michael Torke. The Washington International Competition for Strings will be adjudicated by Dimitri Berlinsky, who is currently on the faculty at Michigan State, Rita Porfiris, currently at the Hartt School, and Paul Katz who has been at the New England Conservatory for many years. Active performing and mentoring activities naturally complement these faculty positions.

We look forward to the opportunity of meeting and interacting with all these outstand-ing judges!

It is always so gratifying when one of our winners is offered an engagement in addition to the competition-related performance opportunities. Such will be the case on November 5th when Mathilda Edge, one of our 2016 vocal winners, will sing in Bruckner's Mass in F Minor with the estimable Robert Shafer's City Choir of Washington at the National Presbyterian Church. We hope to see many of you at this very special performance!

## Alexandria Commission for the Arts Grant to FMMC

he Alexandria Commission for the Arts and the Office of the Arts have awarded a \$4,816 grant for fiscal year 2018 to the FMMC.

The grant was approved to support 16 concerts in Alexandria: ten concerts at the Lyceum, 5 at retirement centers, and 1 to celebrate Avanti's 75th Anniversary at the Rachel Schlesinger Center on March 9, 2018.

The Alexandria Office of the Arts serves as the local arts agency in the City of Alexandria and promotes the value of arts and culture by nurturing, investing in, and celebrating the creative contributions of artists and arts organizations. Through engaging the community, encouraging participation, and facilitating access to the arts, the Office of the Arts works with local artists and arts organizations to build a vibrant community for all of the city's residents, workers, and visitors.

The goals of the Alexandria Commission for the Arts' grant program are to encourage artistic excellence in the city; assist Alexandria-based arts organizations in improving their financial, administrative, and management capabilities; and

provide individual artists with opportunities to create, perform, and present their works.

The FMMC is extremely fortunate to have received such a generous grant. The Alexandria Commission for the Arts and the Office of the Arts previously awarded the FMMC a grant in the amount of \$4,847 for fiscal year 2016. It was used to support the Club's 130th Anniversary.

# News from the Johansen International Competition

## Updates on Winners

*Maya Buchanan, violin* (Third Prize, 2015), was named 2<sup>nd</sup> Laureate in the Junior Division of the 4th Stradivarius International Violin Competition in July 2016, at age 15. In 2015, in addition to her JIC prize, she was a top prizewinner at the 2015 Cooper International Violin Competition. She also appeared on the radio show *From the Top* (Show 317) that took place at the Aspen Music Festival and School on August 14, 2016. She first appeared on *From the Top* when she was 13 (Show 276).

Benjamin Beilman, violin (Third Prize, 2006), Tessa Lark, violin (First Prize, 2006), and Julie Albers, cello (Second Prize, 1997) performed as part of the 2017 Seattle Chamber Music Society Summer Festival. Julie also performed Beethoven's Triple Concerto in September 2017 with the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, where she has been principal cellist since 2014.

Alice Lee, violin (Second Prize, 2015) won First Prize at the 2017 Shean Strings Competition, which took place May 18–20, 2017, at Alberta College, Grant MacEwen University, Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. Alice won First Prize at OSM Manulife Competition 2016 as well as Best Canadian Interpretation Prize. She is studying with Barry Shiffman as a full scholarship student in the Taylor Academy of the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto.

*Esther Yu, cello* (Third Prize, 2015), appeared on Show 316 of *From the Top* in Rochester, NY, on January 17, 2016. She also performed with the Clef Trio on Show 324 in New York, NY, on May 24, 2016. Her bio that was used on the January 2016 show mentioned the JIC:

*"Esther Yu* (cello), 15, is from Rye, New York, and attends Rye High School while studying cello with Minhye Kim in The Juilliard Pre-College Division. She won Third Prize in the 2015 Johansen International Competition, and was a semifinalist in the eighth International Tchaikovsky Competition for Young Musicians in 2014. She is also the principal cellist of the Juilliard Pre-College Symphony. Outside of music, Esther loves to volunteer for non-profit organizations, inspired by her father, who goes to Peru as a medical missionary."

In exciting news, three past JIC cello winners, Santiago Cañón Valencia (Second Prize, 2012), Brannon Cho (First Prize, 2012), and Seungmin Kang (First Prize, 2003) were semi-finalists in the 2017 inaugural Queen Elisabeth International Cello Competition, in Brussels, Belgium. Santiago placed third and Brannon placed sixth in the finals. Seungmin was listed as an "unranked laureate" in the announcement on the competition's website. The finalists' performances are included in a four-CD box set available for sale by the competition; audio and video are also featured on the competition website. In addition, the finalists performed in Brussels (Seungmin on June 8, Brannon on June 13, and Santiago on June 14).

## Local Talent

The Johansen International Competition has attracted local applicants who went on to become semi-finalists and winners and have serious careers in music. Yumi Kendall, cellist from Washington, DC, won a judges' award in 1997 (in 1997 there were only three major winners, first, second, and third; in later years three prizes were added for each instrument) and is now assistant principal of the Philadelphia Orchestra. Christina McGann, a violinist from Potomac, Maryland, won Third Prize in 2000 and is an active performer and teacher.

Rhea Chung was a semi-finalist for the JIC in 2012. She went to Holton-Arms School, lived in Bethesda, and was a student of James Stern for violin and Dina Fleming, a FMMC member, for piano. Now 23, she has an impressive resume (see https://www.rheachung.com/).We recently heard from her about what the experience of being a JIC semi-finalist has meant to her.



"My experiences with JIC started with me as a page-turner for contestants, then years later as a semi-finalist. The other semi-finalists of JIC the year I competed happened to become colleagues of mine many years down the road, as recently as this past year at the Aspen Music Festival and School. Another violinist and I were in the same orchestra at AMFS: Aspen Chamber Symphony.

Generally, I feel the semi-finalists from the year I competed have all gone down successful young artist paths, and it is heartening to think that we all started from the same competition together five years back.

I knew from a young age that I wanted to pursue a career in violin performance. When I was selected as one of JIC's semi-finalists that year, I felt encouraged to continue on the path of bettering myself as a musician.

Thank you for letting me know about WIC; I will definitely consider applying!"
