
an interesting one with much experience in opera and vocal events. See his photo and biography in this newsletter.

An FMMC Story We recently received this letter from a past member and we are delighted to share it with you

n episode occurred in my life that hrought my attention to the existence of an organization called the Friday Morning Music Club. It was summer 1965, and the Rosenblatt family (four children and their parents) was packing to move from a rental into a new home in Silver Spring. We had recently returned to the USA from Liberia and Greece, where Mr. Rosenblatt had been building radio stations for Voice of America. We had been scheduled to go back to Greece, but political disturbances there prevented any return.

One day, amidst mountains of packing boxes, the telephone rang. It was my old friend Helen May. She and I were both graduates of the University of Michigan and fraternity sisters of the national music honors society Sigma Alpha Iota. Helen had a proposition for me. Todd Duncan, Dean at the Music School at Howard University, had just listened to a young lady from Georgia who had a "most remarkable voice." He insisted that she must be introduced to the Washington DC music society and surrounding areas by way of a recital. Would I be available to work with and prep this person—named Jessye Norman—for the upcoming concert?

and we are delighted to share it with you.

I tried to explain that we would be moving right during the timeframe when I should be practicing with Miss Norman for the performance. I finally said "I'll have a solution and a decision as soon as I hear her sing!"

When Miss Norman arrived at my house for our session, I led her on a narrow path through the stacks of moving boxes to the piano. We started with pieces by Handel. Around the fourth bar, I could not believe what I was listening to, and I had to stop. "I'm changing my moving date, and we shall work together to present the gift that you have been blessed with." After our concert, the Washington Post music critic Paul Hume said about Miss Norman's voice, "a voice like this comes by one in a hundred years." Jessye Norman and the Rosenblatt family became one big family and have remained so to this date. Jessye adopted us and we adopted her, and we still share and exchange joyful events and birthday wishes.

Helen encouraged me to become an FMMC member, telling me how dedicated this organization is to music. After I joined I met and made friends with Gertrude Block, Charlotte Shear, Mary Kay Traver, Pauline Futranski, Anne Schein,

Jean Robbins, and Vivian Scott Ramseythe female Horowitz. Hearing of their accomplishments and listening to many 11 AM FMMC concerts definitely inspired me. Gertrude Block, who lived close to our home in Silver Spring, had a pretty good idea of the challenges I had at home. She advised the following: "As soon as all four children are in school full time, I will introduce you to Alexander Lipsky. He will teach you new repertoire and become your mentor, and then you will have the great pleasure of sharing your music on stage at FMMC performances."

The guidance and loads of TLC the FMMC volunteers offered me aided this performer to achieve happy, memorable experiences. How much I learned because of grand opportunities to play around the DC area, including at nursing homes! I

Billie Anderton, loving wife of the late Henry L Anderton, Captain USN, died February 2nd in Virginia Beach where she was in the care of her daughter. Billie started playing violin at the age of eleven, playing recitals through her teen years. She graduated from the Birmingham Conservatory of Music, where she is still listed as one of twelve "notable students." In the 1980s she served as concertmaster for the Alexandria Symphony and she was a long-time member of the Friday Morning Music Club. In her later years, she shared her musical gift by teaching at George Mason University and providing independent violin lessons for numerous students. Billie was a devoted Navy wife who served with the Gray Ladies and as a counselor for Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society. She was a long-time member of Calvary Methodist Church in Arlington and enjoyed providing musical accompaniment for services and other church activities. In August, 2018, she grudgingly admitted her age and celebrated her centennial birthday at a gala outdoor party, surrounded by family and friends at her daughter's farm in Pungo, Virginia.



She is survived by her daughter Carol Webb Darden, son Stephen Anderton and wife Cynthia Fox Anderton of Millington Maryland, son Mark Anderton and wife Katherine Lunsford Anderton of Virginia Beach, son John Anderton and wife Susan Hunter of Portland Oregon and numerous grand, great, and great-grandchildren.

For ten years before her death, Billie's grand-niece Christine Mendez lived with her, providing companionship and a watchful eye on Billie's well-being, for which the family is very grateful.

Billie Anderton was a strong and devoted daughter, sister, wife and mother and will be lovingly remembered.

Publicity from the win also secured me my international debut singing with the PyeongChang Winter Music Festival in South Korea. This was the first major competition I had won, and it gave me a great boost of confidence in claiming my place in this world of performing arts. The support I have felt from those involved with the competition has been so wonderful and very appreciated."
