Dallas Morse Coors Foundation Awards Grant to FMMC

The Dallas Morse Coors Foundation for the Performing Arts has approved an FMMC grant request for \$4,000 for the November 11, 2018, concert held at the Cultural Arts Center, Silver Spring. The concert was presented by the Avanti Orchestra of the FMMC and featured Youjin Lee, last spring's first prize winner for violin at the 2018 Washington International Strings Competition. This is the nineteenth year in a row that the Dallas Morse Coors Foundation has generously supported the FMMC.

The Dallas Morse Coors Foundation for the Performing Arts was established by Mr. Coors in 1990 for the purpose of supporting the performing arts, principally in the greater Washington, DC area and at Cornell University.

The Foundation is administered by a trustee with the assistance of an advisory committee knowledgeable about the performing arts in the Washington area. Successful applicants need to have demonstrated artistic excellence, innovation, community outreach, and strong management and financial stability.

The FMMC is extremely fortunate to have such a loyal supporter of our Club!

Chorale Heads towards Its Second Concert

The Chorale's second concert of the 2018-2019 season is scheduled for January 24/25 and, depending on when you see this, there should be time to attend in person. The concerts will be held at the Church of the Reformation (212 E. Capitol St., NE) starting at 8 PM each evening.

The two works programmed for this concert, one by Mozart and one by Poulenc, were created approximately 170 years apart. Mozart's *Davidde Penitente* (KV 469) was composed in 1785. At the time, Mozart was in a hurry to meet a deadline and took the Kyrie and Gloria from his *C-Minor Mass* (KV427) that he had partially completed three years earlier, added a couple of arias, and used Italian texts instead of Latin. As was usual for Mozart, the resultant work was successful and he achieved his objectives as a composer. However, this work is rarely performed today.

Poulenc's *Stabat Mater*, composed in 1951, is the second work on this program. Poulenc wrote the piece to commemorate the death of a friend and, despite the serious nature of the text, composed a work that varies from somber to frivolous. As with many of Poulenc's other works, strong elements of jazz pervade the music that is scored for five voice parts. In contrast to the rarely heard Mozart, the *Stabat Mater* is a very popular work and performed with great regularity by choruses.

The Chorale, supported by a full orchestra, will be joined by soloists Rhiannon Vaughn and Annie Schwartz, sopranos, and tenor Tae Kwak on the Mozart. Soprano Michelle Fegeas will sing the solos in the Poulenc.

With the completion of this concert, the Chorale will turn its attention to the preparation of music for its third concert. The theme of the final concert of the season will be Opera Meets Broadway and will feature music from a number of well-known works. Soloists (all voice parts) interested in singing should contact Paul Leavitt at chorale@finmc.org to schedule an audition.

February 15th is the cutoff date for applications, and Competition Chair Katie Katinas and the entire Foundation Board are anticipating an especially strong group of vocal applicants this year. Please make a note of the dates of the competition that fall on Memorial Day weekend; Saturday May 25th for the semifinals and Sunday May 26th for the finals. The finals take place at 2:00 PM in the Terrace Theater of the Kennedy Center.

For the first time in the history of the WIC, an orchestra will accompany the finals. The Washington Chamber Orchestra is an excellent local group, founded in 2014, conducted by their up-and-coming young maestro Jun Kim. We are excited that the finalists and our audience will all enjoy an enhanced experience.

For the semifinal round on Saturday, this year's accomplished team of accompanists will be our ubiquitous and esteemed Joy Schreier, who will be joined for the first time by Wei-Han Wu. The semifinal repertoire will consist of art songs in several languages, as well as an oratorio selection. On Sunday, each chosen finalist will present two opera arias accompanied by the orchestra. This will give the judges an overview of the range of each singer's talent and will enable them to make an informed decision regarding the winners. As a reminder, audience members who are present for the entire final round can vote on the special audience prize, named in memory of our beloved FMMC supporter Viola Musher. Clearly you will want to be there!

It stands to reason that there are greater expenses involved in using the orchestra. This year, more than ever, we



would love to count on your financial support of the WIC. A stress-free way to donate is to attend our 2019 WIC benefit. An outstanding participant from the 2011 WIC for piano, Fanny Azzuro, will be coming all the way from Paris to play our only scheduled benefit recital on Monday, April 22nd at 7:30 PM at the Steinway Gallery in North Bethesda. Fanny will present a one-hour program of French and Russian music that will be preceded by a wine and hors d'oeuvres reception. She is sought-after and highly regarded here and abroad as both a recitalist and a chamber music participant. Specific details will follow, but we sincerely hope you will take advantage of this delightful opportunity to support our efforts to enhance our competitions and ensure their continuing relevance. Meet the Composers Group

Musicians will agree that one fundamental need is to perform. But even more fundamental than that is the need to create music. The Friday Morning Music Club has around 25 active composers who belong to a Composers Group that gives them a platform from which to present their latest creations. There are four concerts of music by the group's members every year, the next one being on Friday, Feb. 22 at noon at Calvary Baptist Church.

I participated in the group's first presentation of the year, on Dec. 14. This is a particularly attractive time to attend an FMMC event, since it's the last concert of the year and includes a free holiday lunch—hosted by the Club.

Free lunch aside, another thing said not to exist is interesting and listenable new music. This concert also proved that not to be true.

First up was *A Pebble from the Brook*, a short and engaging work for oboe, horn and piano by Jonathan Newmark, with Newmark himself at the piano. He came back later to play a movement from one of his piano sonatas. Mark G. Simon performed his somewhat virtuosic *Three Etudes* for bass clarinet solo. Leslie Bennett, with Jonathan Hoffman, tenor, and Frank Conlon, piano, presented a trio of compositions based on Emily Dickinson poems, and Sharon Shafer accompanied tenor James Stevens in *Poems of a WWII Veteran*, a tribute to her own father through settings of his poetry.

FMMC composers write in a variety of styles and one can expect a great deal of diversity in a program of their works. One thing all of our composers share is the tremendous amount of effort and dedication required before the program even begins. The compositional process itself can be lengthy, but once completed the music must be copied. The players must then be found and rehearsed. It takes a special kind of performer to be willing to take the risk of devoting time to learning an unknown entity, as opposed to good old Beethoven. But Beethoven got to be Beethoven because there were performers willing to play his music and audiences willing to listen. So the FMMC Composers Group is providing an essential service necessary for the renewal of our art.

Johansen International Competition (JIC) Update: Sharon Park

It is always a great pleasure for members of the JIC Steering Committee to catch up with former winners of our competitions. I was recently in touch with violinist Sharon Park, who tied for third prize in the 2003 JIC. After winning her JIC prize, Ms. Park earned a BM from the New England Conservatory, an MM from Juilliard, and a DMA from the University of Colorado at Boulder. She was awarded second prize and the audience favorite prize at the 2014 Bruce Ekstrand Memorial Performance Competition, a top prize at the Stradivarius International Violin Competition, and the ARTS Award in music from the National Foundation of Advancement in the Arts. She has been a soloist, recitalist, and chamber and orchestral musician, performing in venues such as the Kennedy Center, Carnegie Hall, Zipper Hall at the Colburn School in Los Angeles, Merkin Hall, and the Verona Arena in Italy.

Ms. Park has traveled as a member of an ensemble with New England Conservatory composer and theory professor Pozzi Escot, giving performances of the professor's works in Vermont, Boston, and Hawaii. She is a founding member of the Azur String Quartet, which the *New York Times* praised for "a supple, convincing" performance of Walter Piston's Fifth String Quartet during the Focus Festival at the Juilliard School's Peter J. Sharp Theater.

Ms. Park serves as principal second violin of Central City Opera and acting principal of Boulder Philharmonic, performing frequently with the Colorado Symphony and Boulder Bach Festival Orchestra. She was recently appointed adjunct faculty for chamber music at the University of Colorado at Boulder. She also has released a CD of the six sonatas of Eugene Ysaye. I was privileged to hear this CD, and it is wonderful. Interested persons can purchase it through Amazon or iTunes (www.sharonparkviolin.com/album). In addition to her solo and chamber music performance career, Ms. Park is passionate about music education and community outreach and is determined to bring world-class performances and music education to local communities. Her extensive experience in arts administration draws on her performing experience. Recent arts management engagements include positions as music curator at the Dairy Arts Center, marketing and operations man-

ager for the Colorado Music Festival and Center for Musical Arts, and operations manager at the Colorado Suzuki Institute.

Her chief mentors have included Edward Dusinberre, Ronald Copes, Donald Weilerstein, Robert Lipsett, Michelle Kim, and Alice Schoenfeld.

Ms. Park sent this comment about her experience with the JIC:

I am so thankful for the support of the JIC. Having participated and won in the competition during a pinnacle point in my career, it truly helped shape the path I took as a musician, making it possible for me to further develop my musicianship and continue pursuing my dreams.
