vanti Orchestra's third concert of the season on Friday, March 8, 2019, at Church of the Epiphany in Washington, DC will feature works by Handel, Mozart, and Elgar. We are pleased to present both pianist Christopher Schmitt performing Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 17, and Strings Avenue Quartet joining us for Elgar's Introduction and Allegro, op. 47. Also on the program is Handel's Water Music.

Described as "carefully colored" and "sensitive" by The Washington Post in November of 2015, Christopher Schmitt was also hailed as a "formidable talent" and "mature beyond his years" by The Santa Barbara News-Press, regarding his performance of Liszt's Piano Concerto No. 1 with the Music Academy of the West Festival Orchestra. Having completed his doctorate at The Juilliard School in 2016, he has been sponsored for concerts by the Chopin Foundation of the United States in Miami, the Stecher and Horowitz Foundation in New York, Concerts at the Alden Series in Virginia, and for many performances in the Boston, New York, and Washington DC metropolitan areas. In the summer of 2011, Dr. Schmitt performed 14 chamber music concerts at the Music at Menlo festival. For the last three summers he has performed and taught at the festival Málaga Clasica in Spain as well as performing in July of 2016 in the inaugural year of his own chamber music festival in Barcelona, Classics in Catalan. Dr. Schmitt currently resides in Washington DC, and as pianist of the "President's Own" US Marine Chamber Orchestra, performs regularly in the White House and in concert halls across the Washington DC metropolitan area, leading a multifaceted career as chamber musician, pedagogue, and soloist.

The Strings Avenue Quartet members are Jorge Orozco, violin; Jennifer Lee, violin; Maria Montaño, viola; and Vasily Popov, cello. The ensemble performs regularly throughout the DC metro area.

Violinist Jorge Orozco has performed as a soloist and chamber musician in Cuba, Venezuela, Germany, Austria, and Italy. He is a member of the National Chamber Ensemble and is the concertmaster of the Masterwork Festival Orchestra. Currently he is the director of the instrumental ensembles at Georgetown Visitation School and conducts two orchestras at Maryland Classic Youth Orchestras. Mr. Orozco is a former faculty member of the Levine School of Music and the Valencia Conservatory in Venezuela and former Assistant Concertmaster of the Pensacola Symphony Orchestra. He has performed with the Alexandria Symphony, Mobile Symphony, and the Philadelphia-based Baroque ensemble Vox Amadeus. Mr. Orozco holds a master's degree in music performance from the

University of Southern Mississippi, where he studied with Stephen Redfield and a bachelor's degree in music performance and pedagogy from the Instituto Superior de Artes, Havana, Cuba, where he studied with Roberto Valdés. He has participated in numerous festivals and workshops including the Texas Music Festival, Victoria Bach Festival, Havana Contemporary Music Festival, Vicksburg Chamber Music Festival, the Sterling-Delay Seminar, and the Juilliard Conducting Workshop.

Violinist Dr. Jennifer Lee maintains a diverse teaching and performing career with solo, chamber, and orchestral engagements throughout the United States and abroad. As an orchestral musician, she has performed with the Portland and Baltimore Symphonies, and on international tours with Maestro Christoph Eschenbach and pianist Lang Lang.

Recent collaborations include performances with the Dover Quartet at the Artosphere Festival, and with members of the Aeolus and Left Bank Quartets at the Smithsonian Chamber Music Society on the Stradivarius and Amati instruments of the Smithsonian Collection. Dr. Lee has recorded for the Naxos Label with the Post Classical Ensemble of Washington, DC and Hansler Classic of Germany with Rolf Beck. Upon graduating summa cum laude at Northwestern University with a Bachelor of Music degree as a student of Almita and Roland Vamos, Dr. Lee received her Master of Music degree in Violin Performance at the Manhattan School of Music under the tutelage of Lucie Robert. In 2015, she completed her Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the University of Maryland while serving as teaching assistant to David Salness. Dr. Lee is adjunct faculty at Montgomery College, sectional coach at Georgetown University and she has given residencies and master classes at the University of Arkansas and State University of New York at Geneseo. She has also taught at Brooklyn College and Ithaca College's Summer Music Academy, and is a former teaching artist for the Midori and Friends Foundation in New York City.

Violist Dr. Maria Montaño started her musical studies in the youth orchestra network known as El Sistema, in her home country, Venezuela. She came to the United States to continue her music studies and has been actively involved in the musical scene in the Washington metropolitan area. She has established a studio both as a faculty member of the Levine School of Music and privately. She enjoys working with the Maryland Classic Youth Orchestras

(MCYO) as a viola coach and strings coach. She is also involved with the Youth Orchestra of the Americas and a former faculty member of the Landon School. Dr. Montaño is an active orchestra player with the National Philharmonic and the Alexandria Symphony Orchestra and an active chamber musician with her husband, violinist Jorge Orozco and with pianist Carlos Rodriguez. She is a former member of the Vox Amadeus Ensemble, Mobile Symphony Orchestra, and Assistant Principal Viola of the Pensacola Symphony Orchestra. Dr. Montaño holds a D.M.A. and M.M. in Viola Performance from the University of Maryland and a B.M. in Viola Performance from the University of Southern Mississippi. She has studied with Katherine Murdock, Daniel Foster, Michael Tree, Hsiaopei Lee, Michael Kimber, Roberto Valdes, and Tomás Fajardo.

Cellist Vasily Popov maintains an active concert schedule including appearances as a soloist, recitalist and member of chamber ensembles in concert halls in Europe, Japan, Russia and U.S.A. His CDs are produced by Arte Nova Records, BMR and appear under the Excelsior, Intercount Music, Madacy Records, and Melodia labels. Vasily Popov studied with Natalia Gutman, Valentin Elin, Konstantin Kucherov, Anatoly Nikitin, Walter Nothas and Daniil Shafran. His performance style was influenced by chamber music collaborations and studies with pianists Tamara Fidler and Elisso Virsaladze and flutist Andras Adorjan.

Mr. Popov held an associate principal cello position with the Soloists of St. Petersburg chamber ensemble and a cello section position with the St.Petersburg Philharmonic Orchestra

He leads various workshops and master classes and adjudicates national and international competitions.

He performs on a French cello made in 1870 presented to him by Stephen and Susan Low. Vasily uses his Zeta E-Cello for his jazz, rock and contemporary music performances.

JIC News: Updates on Winners

Violist Matthew Lipman (2009 JIC, first prize), an Avery Fisher Career Grant recipient, recently published an article in *Strings* magazine in which he wrote about learning a new work he commissioned to honor his late mother. The title is *Metamorfose for Viola and Piano*, composed by Clarice Assad in 2017 and published in March 2018 by Virtual Artists Collective Publishing. He also has performed in recital at Lincoln Center and with the Minnesota Orchestra

Cellist Michał Balas (2018 JIC, first prize tied) performed Tchaikovsky's *Variations on a Rococo Theme* with the DC-area-based Apollo Orchestra on January 20, 2019 and received a favorable review by Joan Reinthaler on the website Washington Classical Review:

The hit of the afternoon was 17-yearold cellist Michał Balas, whose sweettoned take on the opening theme of Tchaikovsky's Variations on a Rococo Theme belied a fearlessly acrobatic technique in succeeding variations. Most impressive was the varied repertoire of attacks on individual notes, from gorgeous legatos and soft mini-slides to steely snaps. This young artist, who has studied in the U.S. and in his native Poland, has been winning his way through the requisite competitions. He is still taking a literal approach to this music's phrasing, but that may relax as he matures.

With the completion of this concert, the Chorale has turned its attention to the preparation of music for its third concert. The theme of the final concert of the season will be Opera Meets Broadway and present music from an number of well-known works.
