

Orchestra Options:

a) An informal, stress-free chamber orchestra that would play the basic classics of the orchestral repertoire (e.g., G. F. Händel's Concerti Grossi, various Haydn symphonies, etc). The group would not necessarily give concerts.

b) An un-auditioned orchestra that would give concerts based on a wider, more difficult repertoire.

Chamber Music Options:

c) Informal chamber music get-togethers with individuals rotating among groups—with no audience; no final performance; no coaching.

d) Chamber music get-togethers for pre-formed groups culminating in a (voluntary) performance before a sympathetic audience of other performers. e) Chamber music get-togethers (e.g., option 3 or 4 above) combined with pot-lucks and an opportunity to socialize with other members.

f) More ambitious chamber music workshops with professional coaching and an audience made up of other Club members.

g) Help from the Club when you need other musicians to play chamber music.

h) Help set up coaching for your own ensemble under the coaching program of the ACMP.

Outreach

The FMMC Outreach Program brings musical performances to senior venues in the Washington, DC area. In the 2013-14 season (May 2013- April 2014), 17 of our members gave a total of 57 performances at 37 separate sites in Washington DC and its Maryland and Virginia suburbs. Venues included the Lombardi Cancer Center, Springhouse, Manor Care, and Georgetown Senior Center to name just a few. The Outreach program and the entire Club owe a debt of gratitude to pianist Ellen Tenenbaum who remains the heart and soul of our Outreach program. Ellen alone gave 30 performances last year. In addition to Ellen, Amy Rothstein volunteered her services as accompanist on a regular basis. A variety of instrumentalists, chamber musicians and vocalists participated in the program.

Although we had a productive year, participation has declined somewhat from the past. The program can be challenging since the facilities are not always the best. But the response is heart-warming. One volunteer recalls "I also remember the people there, some of whom were very appreciative. There was a lovely elderly lady who went to her room after I played and gave me a little present from the calligraphy she does to keep busy." At another performance, a lady who was at least 90 years old came up to me and asked if I'd mind just coming over to the facility to do my practicing. She said she loved to listen to live music—no matter how polished or unpolished it was.

I'd like to encourage our members, both Performance and especially Associate, to consider participating in the Outreach program. The program offers an outstanding way to develop your performance skills, render service to the community, share your love of music with an appreciate audience, and contribute to the impact the Club makes on the community. Besides the obvious benefit to individuals, by providing solid evidence of our impact on the community, these performances benefit the Club itself when we apply for grants and look for benefactors. And besides, it simply feels good when you make a musical connection with these wonderful and oft-times needy seniors.

Alive Inside: A Story of Music and Memory

Homer called it "grievous old-age." We call it senility. Henry, 94, suffers from dementia. He sits as silent as a brick, hunched over in his wheelchair. He no longer recognizes his own daughter. Denise is bipolar. She shuffles along behind her walker, one minute shouting with happiness, the next raging against the cruelty of world. Marylou is a victim of Alzheimer's. She can't tell a fork from a spoon. She can't even write her own name.

What do we do with these people? We warehouse them, millions of them, in nursing homes across the country. Half of them have no visitors. America decided some years ago that old age is a problem for medicine, not for the social welfare system. Consequently, many who are not physically ill end their days as "patients" in nursing homes. There they are treated with anti-depressants and other drugs designed to combat mental illness, not old age in general. Many are knowingly over-medicated.

Into this Slough of Despond steps Dan Cohen, musical therapist, giving "patients" Apple iPods programmed with the music they enjoyed when they were young. The results are astounding. Henry, virtually catatonic for years, immediately sings and swings with the music. More remarkable still, he begins to remember things. He starts talking about his past. Denise, who has been tied to her walker for years, pushes it aside to dance with the therapist. Marylou also dances. Both shed tears of joy.

"Too good to be true," you say?

Even though Cohen's non-profit Music and Memory organization has unleashed a flood of miracles throughout the country (see musicandmemory.org), music can't cure or permanently reverse the scourge of Alzheimer's, dementia or the other indignities of aging. But it can reach the unreachable, reducing their isolation while improving their overall mood. Progressive, open-minded physicians admit that music can do more to relieve the loss of personal identity and dignity than medicine itself.

"Alive Inside" is vivid proof of the restorative power of music. It clearly shows that victims of Alzheimer's and dementia are still "alive inside" and that they can still be reached—by music. The film reminds us of the importance (and kindness!) of all musicians who donate time and talent to bring live music to nursing homes and retirement communities. 2⁰¹⁵ is an especially big year for the Friday Morning Music Club Foundation. While most of you realize we have the Johansen Competition for Young String Players (aged 13-17) coming up in March and the Washington International Competition for Strings in June, you may not be aware that the Washington International Competition for Composition will take place this year as well.

Added in 1976, and taking place every three years, the WIC for Composition requires the submission of an original chamber work for a string ensemble of 3-5 players, i.e., a string trio, string quartet, piano trio, piano quartet or piano quintet. In addition to financial prizes, there is the outstanding opportunity of a debut performance of the winning work at the Terrace Theater of the Kennedy Center by a group of professional musicians during the finals of the WIC for Strings. Mark Simon, both a talented clarinetist and composer in his own right, is the current chair of this project. The deadline for submissions is February 15th. Complete information is available on the FMMC.org site. Mark would be happy to answer any questions directly at diegobueno1@mac. com.

Applications are in for the JIC and there is a nice increase over the previous competition and an impressive representation of students from 19 different countries. Predictions for the WIC for Strings are quite positive as well.

Jonathan Carney to Perform with Avanti

A cclaimed Baltimore Symphony Orchestra violinist Jonathan Carney will join FMMC's conductor Pablo Saelzer and the Club's Avanti Orchestra for an all-Brahms concert on Saturday, March 14, 2015, 7:30 pm, at the Cultural Arts Center, Silver Spring, MD. Mr. Carney will perform Brahms' *Violin Concerto in D major*. Also on the program is Brahms' *Serenade No. 1 in D major*.

Mr. Carney is in his 13th season as BSO concertmaster, after 12 seasons in the same position with London's Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.

Born in New Jersey, Mr. Carney hails from a musical family in which six members graduated from The Juilliard School. After completing his studies with Ivan Galamian and Christine Dethier, he was awarded a Leverhulme Fellowship to continue his studies in London at the Royal College of Music.

After enjoying critically acclaimed

international tours as both concertmaster and soloist with numerous ensembles, Mr. Carney was invited by Vladimir Ashkenazy to become concertmaster of the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra in 1991. He was also appointed



concertmaster of the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra in 1994 and the Basque National Orchestra in 1996. Recent solo performances have included concertos by Bruch, Korngold, Khatchaturian, Sibelius, and Nielsen, as well as the Brahms Double Concerto and Vaughan Williams' The Lark Ascending which was featured as a live BBC broadcast from London's Barbican Hall. Mr. Carney has made a number of recordings, including concertos by Mozart, Vivaldi, and Nielsen; sonatas by Brahms, Beethoven, and Franck; and a disc of virtuoso works by Sarasate and Kreisler performed with his mother Gloria Carney as pianist. New releases include Beethoven's Archduke and Ghost trios, Schubert's cello quintet, and a Dvorak disc with the Terzetto and four Romantic pieces for violin.

The Dallas Morse Coors Foundation for the Performing Arts approved a FMMC grant request for \$4,000 to support the November 5, 2014 concert held at the Kennedy Center Terrace Theater. The concert was presented by the Avanti Orchestra of the FMMC and featured Somang Jeagal, First Prize winner of the 2014 Washington International Piano Competition. This is the fifteenth consecutive year that the Dallas Morse Coors Foundation has generously supported the FMMC.

The Dallas Morse Coors Foundation for the Performing Arts was established by Mr. Coors in 1990 for the purpose of supporting the arts, principally in the greater Washington, D.C. area and at Cornell University.

The Foundation is administered by a trustee with the assistance of an advisory committee knowledgeable about the performing arts in this area. Successful applicants need to demonstrate artistic excellence, innovation, community outreach, and strong management and financial stability.

Where are they now? Johansen International String Competition Updates

A merican cellist **Julie Albers** won second prize in the first (1997) Johansen International Competition. She has since established an impressive career both as a performer and as an educator, and has just been appointed principal cellist with the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra starting in the 2015-16 season.

In North America, Ms. Albers has performed with many important orchestras and ensembles. Recent performances have included exciting debuts in the San Francisco Performances series and with the Grant Park Music Festival where she

performed Penderecki's *Concerto Grosso for 3 Cellos* with Mr. Penderecki conducting.

Past seasons have included concerto appearances with the Orchestras of Colorado, Indianapolis, San Diego, Seattle, Vancouver, and, in Germany, the Münchener Kammerorchester. In addition to solo performances, Ms. Albers regularly participates in chamber music festivals around the world. 2009 marked the end of a three-year residency with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center Two. She is currently active with the Albers String Trio and the Cortona Trio.

At the age of 17, Julie made her major orchestral debut with the Cleveland Orchestra, and then performed in recitals and with orchestras throughout North America, Europe, Korea, Taiwan, Australia, and New Zealand. In 2001, she won Second Prize in Munich's Internationaler Musikwettbewerb der ARD, and was also awarded the



Wilhelm-Weichsler-Musikpreis der Stadt Osnabrück. While in Germany, she recorded solo and chamber music of Kodaly for the Bavarian Radio, performances that have been heard throughout Europe. In 2003, she was named the first Gold Medal Laureate of South Korea's Gyeongnam International Music Competition, winning the \$25,000 Grand Prize.

Teaching is also an important part of Ms. Albers' musical life. She is currently Assistant Professor and holds the Mary Jean and Charles Yates Cello Chair at the McDuffie Center for

Strings at Mercer University in Macon, Georgia. About the JIC competition, Albers writes:

"I have such fond memories of participating in JIC! It was one of the first major competitions I ever took part in and my overwhelming memory of being there was how supported I felt by everybody involved. I've found that competitions can sometimes be very cold environments where one really feels alone and like you are truly in competition with everybody else there. JIC did a wonderful job in creating an atmosphere of warmth and friendship where you could generally be happy for others performing well. What a wonderful first experience! It's been really neat running into or working with musicians over the years that I first met here! This is a wonderful organization that I feel privileged to be a part of!"

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FMMC Dues Increase – July 1, 2015

During the past few years many non-profit organizations dedicated to the performing arts have experienced financial difficulties in covering their annual operational expenses. This problem is mainly due to rising costs, although declining memberships and smaller contributions are also factors.

Membership dues for FY 2014 totaled \$37,828 and accounted for only 24% of the FMMC Operations Budget of \$156,958. At the FMMC Annual Meeting on May 9, 2014, members approved an increase of \$10 for each of the following categories. The change will take effect on **July 1, 2015**:

CATEGORY	FY 2014	FY 2015
Regular Local	\$85	\$95
Out-of-Town	\$60	\$70
Members, age 23-30	\$50	\$60
Members, age 70 or above	\$65	\$75
Family Members	\$65	\$75
(two or more adult members, same address, each)		

There was no increase in Student Members (age 14–22, by audition only) that remains at \$25. The FMMC Board of Governors also approved a \$50 increase in the Organizational Members (non-profit) rate of \$175 to \$225 and in the Organizational Members (for profit) Rate of \$350 to \$400. ●
