## President's Message

First things first—I am asking ALL members to please put the January 13 and 14 FMMC Chorale and Orchestra concerts on your calendar. These are very special concerts— they will honor late Club member and former Club Foundation Director Charlotte Holloman, thanks to a generous grant from the Nancy Peery Marriott Foundation. The concerts will also feature a cantata by composer Stephen Burton Douglas that is based on Martin Luther King's "I Have a Dream" speech and was performed at the Club's 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration. Additionally, the concert timing marks both Martin Luther King's birthday and the end of the historic Obama Administration. Please plan to attend.



As you know, one of the Club's principal missions is "to promote young musical talent through student and in-

ternational competitions, with concert opportunities for winners." November was a banner month for this enterprise and members of the FMMC should be proud of how the Club is fostering young talent.

The first of these events was the November 18 Avanti concert featuring the 2016 Washington International Competition (WIC) Voice winner, Maggie Finnegan. Those of us who attended the competition last Spring remember her arrival at the competition site – dressed casually amid the generally more formally-dressed competitor group, she sat slumped on a chair outside awaiting her turn, not speaking or making eye contact with any of us. But when she sang, it was an entirely different story – nothing casual about that! Her precision, the clarity of her beautiful voice, her chosen "art song" revealed a superb level of artistry, performance charm, and meticulous technique that made her the competition's First Prize winner. The skills that led to her prize were very much in evidence at the Avanti concert, where she thrilled the audience with an expressive performance of a lovely set of songs by young composer Andrew Hsu, followed by a rendition of Leonard Bernstein's "Glitter and Be Gay" that was loaded with Broadway pizzazz. Then, to everyone's surprise, she had a charming bit part in Avanti's splendid performance of the very difficult "Three Cornered Hat" by Manuel de Falla following intermission. It is a real pity this concert was not reviewed.

The day following the Avanti concert the Club held its annual High School Competition for Strings, which attracted a high level of student competitors. The competition was ably managed by the Club's Program Director, Jeongseon Choi. Next, on November 25, two winners of the student string competition were among the four performers at a student recital at Strathmore Mansion, managed very graciously by Christine Kharazian, our Student Activities Director. The level of performance at this recital – with two cellists, a violinist and a pianist – was superb. I hope to see these performers appear at our future international competitions. Importantly, these students and their parents emphasized the valuable role of our student competitions and recital opportunities in motivating students to continue their studies and encouraging them to develop their musical skills and performance confidence.

Again, on the student front: the Club is working on developing a program for student chamber music coaching, using a bequest from our late and much loved Club member, Frances Kaplan. Solo performance is wonderful, but we want young people also to be exposed early to the joys of chamber music. We hope to be able to announce this program in the near future.

One final note: You will all receive a proposal for a Club bylaw amendment in the near future. The amendment would add the Avanti Manager and Chorale Chair as *ex officio* voting members of the FMMC Board of Governors. I urge you to vote "yes" to these proposals. Avanti and the FMMC Chorale are the two largest programs in the Club's budget and the Avanti Manager and Chorale Chair are among the most regular attendees at Club Board meetings. They should be made voting members of the Board because of the importance of their positions to the Club's activities and operation.

#### Prizes

At the discretion of the judges, the following prizes will be awarded: George Manos Piano Prize First Prize \$1000, Second Prize \$700, Third Prize \$500.

All winners, including Honorable Mentions, will be awarded a one-year membership to FMMC which includes eligibility to perform in FMMC Student Concerts.

#### Repertoire

Students must be prepared to play four works—one in each of the following categories:

 A prelude *and* fugue from either volume of the Well-Tempered Clavier by J. S. Bach or two other comparable pieces from the Baroque period,

- 2. The first movement of a sonata by Beethoven (excluding Op. 49), Mozart (excluding K 545), Haydn (excluding early Divertimenti), or Schubert,
- 3. A substantial work from the Romantic Period,
- 4. An impressionist work *or* a work from the 20th or 21st century.

## **Concert Review**

The Friday Morning Music Club Chamber Series is in full swing with concerts held most Fridays at Noon at the Calvary Baptist Church at 8<sup>th</sup> and G Street NW in Washington D.C. The November 19, 2016, concert included beautiful performances of both old favorites and more obscure works performed by dedicated, talented musicians.

The concert opened with guitarist Ben Altman performing a three-movement Sonatina by the Spanish composer Frederico Moreno Torroba (1891 – 1982). Ben earned his Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Eastman Conservatory with prior musical studies at the San Francisco Conservatory and the Peabody Institute. He has performed for audiences across the United States and currently teaches at Opal Music Studio, the International School of Music, and the Potomac School. Torroba was a prolific composer of solo guitar music who wrote a Sonatina for the great Spanish guitarist, Andres Segovia. It was a treat to hear the work through Ben's performance.

Spanish music also featured on the program in Judith Block's performance of four Scarlatti sonatas. Judith, the Secretary for the Friday Club's Board of Governors, holds degrees in piano performance from Northwestern University and the Eastman School of Music. She has resumed her performance career after teaching privately and for the Washington DC public schools for many years. Judith offered a selection of two major- and two minor-key sonatas and her performance captured the varied moods and quirkiness of the composer. Judith followed Scarlatti with a performance of an early Chopin polonaise, op. 71, no. 1.

The concert concluded with six early chansons of Claude Debussy. Many listeners are less familiar with French art songs than with the lieder of Schubert, Schumann, or Brahms. The songs on this program were passionately performed with exquisite French diction and close collaboration between the voice and piano. Soprano Mandy Brown, who is enjoying an increasingly busy performance career in opera and song, performed as a guest with Steven Schwartz at the piano. In addition to holding a piano performance degree from San Diego State University, Steven holds a PhD in logic, and worked as a computer consultant for many years. He teaches piano, composes, and is a frequent performer in the Washington, DC area.

The concert was a lovely way to spend the noon hour. Attendance at the Cavalry concerts has varied, but we had a large audience for this recital. We hope more Club members and their guests will enjoy the concerts in our Friday chamber series.

## An Inspirational Evening At Westminster

Two recent FMMC award winners and a visual artist presented a lively and entertaining evening that combined music, visual arts, and audience socializing at Westminster at Lake Ridge Retirement Community on November 19. The two musicians were euphonium player Joe Broom, a recent First Place winner of FMMC's Ross-Roberts Competition for Woodwinds, Brass and Percussion (and star of our 2016 Luncheon), and violinist Sean Lim, winner of the Club's High School Competition for Strings. As the two played, visual artist Mark Fleuridor sketched them.

Joe and Sean played pieces by Niccolo Paganini, Allen Vizzutti, Ernest Chausson, Steven Bryant, Samuel Barber and Philip Sparke, accompanied by Club Program Director and pianist Jeongseon Choi, who had spent most of the day managing the Club's High School Competition for Strings. Mark did skillful sketches of the performers, and a gallery of artwork by both Mark and another young artist from Detroit, Nia Crutcher, decorated the performance space. The evening offered a convergence of performing and visual arts. At the end of the concert, the audience enjoyed viewing the sketches and other art and discussing the music with the performers.

Not only was the evening a splendid success, the genesis of the project was also particularly interesting. Joe has become a great favorite with the Westminster Community because of his past performances there and his way of relating to the audience. When site coordinator Leslie Bennett (who is a soprano Performance Member and member of FMMC Composers Group) asked Jeongseon to include him in the November 25 student recital, Joe agreed. However, in order to do the Westminster concert, Joe had to cancel a performance in New York City and fly from Michigan where he is a student at the University of Michigan. He requested that visual artist Mark, who would have joined him at the NYC event, be included. Jeongseon also thought that Sean Lim would be a fine complement to

Joe for this program, although he no longer lives in the Washington area. Sean, given an honorable mention of the National YoungArts Foundation and a winner of many awards and competitions, moved to Cleveland after being selected by Jamie Laredo for his high school young artists' program and is now a student at the

Cleveland Institute of Music. Despite the distance, Sean agreed to perform for the Westminster event. Thus, all the evening's young performers travelled to Washington at their own expense for this concert. The two musicians showed a remarkable degree of loyalty to the Club and particularly to Jeongseon Choi, whose devotion to promoting young musical talent is exceptional.

You might be interested in Joe's own comments on the evening, taken from his Facebook page: "After an incredible experience with my University of Michigan Symphony Band colleagues Friday night, I flew to Virginia Saturday morning to be part of an amazing partnership that presented a collaborative concert of visual and performing arts. Huge thanks to Westminster at Lake Ridge for hosting the event. Special thanks also to my YoungArts colleague and Chamber Unique\* visiting artist Mark Fleuridor, my 'From the Top' colleague violinist Sean Lim, and the Friday Morning Music Club, Inc. Leslie Bennett and Dr. Jeongseon Choi, FMMC Program Director and the night's accompanist, created a fantastic and welcoming place for all of the artists and the large, enthusiastic audience."

## An Evening at the Uzbekistan Embassy

he delightful recital by our 2015 Washington International Competition violin winner Nadir Khashimov on Friday, November 11th at the Embassy of Uzbekistan was a double treat. Not only did those who attended hear an impressive and entertaining recital by Nadir and his outstanding accompanist (and wife) Barno Nishanova, but they also had the unique opportunity of visiting one of Washington's iconic buildings. Constructed in 1909 for the coal magnate Clarence Moore, the building was sold to the Canadian government after Moore went down with the Titanic in 1912. Uzbekistan purchased the building in 1992 after the dissolution of the USSR. The building's architectural and decorative details are fascinating and nicely complemented by the examples of Uzbek arts and costumes now on display.

All in all, the capacity audience, including several FMMC members (some pictured), enjoyed an enchanting evening. Many thanks to Jerome Barry and the Embassy Series for arranging this memorable event. Special thanks as well to photographer Morris Simon of The Simon Firm for the photos.

# It's Concert Time

The Chorale is looking forward to entertaining a large audience with its all American Composer program on January 13 and 14 at the Church of the Reformation (212 E. Capitol St., NE). Supported by a grant from the Nancy Peery Marriott Foundation, this concert was developed to honor the memory of Charlotte W. Holloman, a well-known soprano and voice teacher who was a long-time member of the Club and President of the FMMC Foundation. Mrs. Holloman's daughter plans to attend the concert.

Three of the works on the program are from the middle of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century (Barber, Bernstein and Burton) while the fourth work is newly composed and orchestrated by Paul Leavitt for this, its premier performance.

The program will open with a short work for chorus and orchestra by the Chorale's conductor, Paul Leavitt. Mr. Leavitt chose Modern Greek for this, his newest work, appropriately entitled *In the Beginning*.

This introduction will be followed by Stephen Douglas Burton's cantata titled *I Have a Dream*, based on the famous speech by the Reverend Martin Luther King. The cantata was commissioned by the FMMC in 1986 as part of the Club's celebration of its 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary. This will be the first time that the FMMC Chorale will perform the work, as the cantata's premier performance was sung by The University of Maryland Chorus, accompanied by the Club's orchestra. Mr. Burton will be in the audience for these performances.

Samuel Barber's *Agnus Dei* was composed in 1967 and was based on his *Adagio for Strings*, one of the most well-known works for string orchestra. *Agnus Dei*, which can be done accompanied or *a ca-* *pella*, closely follows the *Adagio*, with only minor differences. For this performance, the orchestra will accompany the Chorale.

Leonard Bernstein's *Chichester Psalms* was composed 1965 and combines the texts of 6 different psalms from the Old Testament. Sung in Hebrew, it is both a difficult and extremely satisfying piece to present for both the chorus and orchestra.

In summing up this concert, Paul Leavitt notes: "It seems to me that Dr. King's dream was akin to the dream of the psalmist who wrote:
