Daughter Beatrice, 15, won first prize on viola in the 2018 Johansen International Competition for Young String Players and is now enrolled at the Curtis Institute of Music. Son Noah, 14, plays cello and is enrolled in the Pre-College program at the Juilliard School. Their parents are Robert Chen, Concertmaster of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, and Laura Chen, formerly a violinist in the Boston Symphony Orchestra and the Philadelphia Orchestra, and now a faculty member at the Aspen Music Festival and School. 

Where They Are Now: Nancy Zhou Wins Shanghai Isaac Stern Violin Competition

ancy Zhou, 2009 Johansen International Competition first-prize violin winner, won first prize at the Shanghai Isaac Stern Violin Competition in September 2018. The prize includes a \$100,000 cash award and performing contracts with top orchestras. She received the highest score out of the 27 semifinalists, who had been chosen from 174 contestants from 33 countries. At the final round of the competition, she performed Chinese composer Chen Qigang's La joie de la souffrance and Tchaikovsky's Violin Concerto in D Major, op. 35 with the Shanghai Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Michael Stern.

Nancy was born in 1993 and started playing the violin at age 4. She began giving recitals at 5, and between 2001 and 2009 was invited to play in master classes taught by Peter Oundjian, Nadja Salerno-Sonnenberg, Pinchas Zukerman, Koichiro Harada (of Japan's Toho School of Music), and Glenn Dicterow. She performed under the conductor Kurt Masur in 2009.

Prior to and since winning her JIC prize, she has achieved distinction (semifinalist, finalist, and/or prizes for "best performance of") in numerous competitions since she was 10 years old, including the 2006 Wieniawski International Competition, the 2010 International Jean Sibelius Violin Competition, the 2011 International Tchaikovsky Competition, the 2012 Oueen Elisabeth Competition, the 2014 International Violin Competition of Indianapolis, the 2015 Joseph Joachim International Violin Competition, and the 2015 Sibelius International Violin Competition. She won second prize in the 2017 Isang Yun Competition and first prize in the 2018 Harbin International Music Competition.

She has appeared as a soloist with many orchestras, including the China National Symphony Orchestra, the Shanghai Symphony Orchestra, the San Anto-

nio Symphony, the Tongyeong Festival Orchestra, the Finnish Radio Symphony Orchestra, the Helsinki Philharmonic Orchestra, the National Orchestra of Belgium, the Royal Stockholm Philharmonic Orchestra, the Munich Symphony Orchestra, the Saint Petersburg Philharmonic Orchestra, the Orchestre Royal de Chambre de Wallonie, and the Baden-Baden Philharmonic.

Since 2008, Nancy has been sponsored by the Anne-Sophie Mutter Foundation, frequently collaborating with the German violinist on tours in Europe, Asia, and the United States and receiving scholarships generously endowed by the foundation. For the Shanghai competition, she used a 1690 "Stephens" Stradivari violin from Florian Leonhard Fine Violins, a loan which was facilitated by the foundation.

She is a graduate of Harvard University with a degree in English and also attended the New England Conservatory, where she studied with Miriam Fried. She is now under management of Fazer Artists' Management, Inc., which includes in its roster Sarah Chang, Evgeny Kissin, Emanuel Ax, Vladimir Ashkenazy, Joshua Bell, Jonathan Biss, Frans Helmerson, Stephen Hough, among other renowned artists.

An excellent interview with Nancy appeared on the website violinist.com in September 2018 (www.violinist.com/ blog/laurie/20189/27449/), in which she talks with Laurie Niles about her experiences participating in the Shanghai competition, her family connection with that city, her involvement with the Anne-Sophie Mutter Foundation, and her plans for the future. She is currently studying at the Queen Elisabeth Music Chapel in Belgium with Augustin Dumay, where, she told Laurie, "I think the next step is just to meet more musicians and get involved in the community, in the classical music scene. At this point I'm 25, I think I'm ready to socialize!"

Brian Ganz To Present The Next Piano Master Class

The Washington Post has written: "One comes away from a recital by pianist Brian Ganz not only exhilarated by the power of the performance, but also moved by his search for artistic truth."

E steemed pianist and pedagogue Brian Ganz will present a master class for FMMC on Thursday, December 6 from 10:00 am until noon at the International Piano Archives at the University of Maryland (IPAM). IPAM is located in the Performing Arts Library of the Clarice Center for the Performing Arts. Three pianists will have the benefit of the excellent teaching/coaching skills of Mr. Ganz.

Brian Ganz is widely regarded as one of the leading pianists of his generation. A laureate of the Margerite Long Jacques Thibaud and the Queen Elisabeth of Belgium International Piano Competitions, he has appeared as soloist with such orchestras as the St. Louis Symphony, the National Philharmonic, the St. Petersburg Philharmonic, L'Orchestre Lamoureux, the Baltimore Symphony, the National Symphony, and the City of London Sinfonia, and has performed with such conductors as Leonard Slatkin, Marin Alsop, Mstislav Rostropovich, and Piotr Gajewski.

Mr. Ganz is in a multi-year project in partnership with the National Philharmonic in which he will perform the complete works of Chopin at the Music Center at Strathmore. After the inaugural recital, the Washington Post wrote: "Brian Ganz was masterly in his first installment of the complete works of Chopin." A member of the piano faculty of the Peabody Conservatory, Mr. Ganz is artist-in-residence at St. Mary's College of Maryland. In 2001, he was honored to serve on the jury of the Long Thibaud competition in Paris. He is the artist editor of the Schirmer Performance Edition of Chopin's Preludes.

The Clarice Center for the Performing Arts is located at University Blvd. and Alumni Drive, College Park, Md. Parking is available in the adjacent Stadium Garage.


