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
Celebrating Our 130th Anniversary

For the uninitiated, the FMMC Outreach Program facilitates small ensemble concerts of approximately one hour at senior facilities and other non-traditional performance spaces. FMMC's role is limited to tracking performances, facilities, and volunteer musicians. The rest is up to you: you select the music, the venue, and the players; you coordinate dates and times with the venue; and you bask in the warmth of sharing your gifts with music lovers who are sincerely grateful to hear you.

As you begin to make your plans for the year, we encourage both performing and non-performing members of FMMC to include Outreach Program recitals as part of your season. Those of us behind the scenes are exploring ways to upgrade your experience and if you have recommendations, do not hesitate to share them with me.

FMMC Operating Budget for FY 2016

The FMMC Board of Governors approved an operating budget for FY 2016 at its September Board meeting on September 18, 2015. The budget of \$207,875 is \$26,950 or 15% above last year's budget of \$180,925.

This increase was due mainly to two categories; Public Relations (+\$5,300) and Hospitality/Special Receptions (+\$22,490) which mostly target the celebration of the 130th Anniversary Opera Gala at the Schlesinger Center on April 17, 2016.

It is important to understand that the FMMC General Fund budget of \$115,330 should cover only about 55% of total FMMC expenses. All other costs (\$92,545 or 45%) are expected to be paid for mainly from income received from Grant awards (\$10,000), or monies released from the Endowment Fund (\$52,225) or the Special Funds (\$30,320).

Unaudited actual income and expenses for FY 2015 were \$170,460 or 6% below the budget. Much of the savings can be attributed to the support and generosity of FMMC members.

Washington International Competition Composition Winners

Two young and exciting compositional voices were honored on June 7, 2015 at the Kennedy Center as winners of the Washington International Competition for Composition (WIC). As the judges retired to make their final decisions in the WIC for Strings, the Sunrise String Quartet took to the stage to present the winning compositions by Roydon Tse and Mian Chen.

Roydon Tse won the first prize of \$5000 for his *Tempest* for string quartet. Tse, 24, is a native of Hong Kong and a doctoral student in composition at the University of Toronto. Mian Chen won the second prize of \$2500 for her *Debate* for string quartet. Chen, 22, is a native of Shanghai, a student of music at the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto, and a student in immunology and pharmacology at the University of Toronto. Both composers were on hand to receive the enthusiastic audience ovation for their works.

The actual competition took place over the previous 9 months, as a call for scores produced a submission of 89 scores from 17 different countries. The panel of

judges charged with reviewing this bounty of material was comprised of Michael Torke, Mark Taggart, and John Hilliard. Torke is celebrated for his Color Music for orchestra, and his opera Strawberry Fields. Taggart is professor of composition at East Carolina State University, Greenville, North Carolina. John Hilliard is retired from the faculty of James Madison University.

Obituary • Charlotte Wesley Holloman

The Friday Morning Music Club mourns the passing of Charlotte Wesley Holloman, 93, who died on July 20, 2015, in Washington, D.C. Ms. Holloman served as Director of the Friday Morning Music Club Foundation from 1991 – 1995 and also directed the Foundation's International Competition for Singers. She was a performance member of the FMMC as a solo soprano. Ms. Holloman was active in several other musical organizations including the Vocal Arts Society, the National Association of Teachers of Singing, and the National Association of Negro Musicians.

Ms. Holloman was a pioneer African American classical singer who won prominence in the years following WW II. She grew up in Washington, D.C. and received her musical education in piano and voice at Howard and Columbia Universities. She debuted on Broadway in 1950 in a production of "The Barrier," a play based on a story by Langston Hughes. Many Broadway, concert, and opera appearances followed, including a 1954 solo recital at New York City's Town Hall. Over the years she sang leading roles in more than fifteen operas in a variety of musical styles, including "The Magic Flute," "Tosca," "Das Rheingold," and "Iphigenia in Aulis."

Ms. Holloman taught voice at Howard University for more than 20 years before retiring in 2013 as a Master Instructor. She also taught at many other local universities and maintained her own studio. She was known for her passion for singing and for her desire to mentor her students. She continued her devotion to teaching through her illness and gave her last voice lesson from her nursing home bed one week before her death.

Ms. Holloman is survived by her daughter, Charlotte Holloman, of Washington, D.C. A memorial service took place on August 6, 2015 at Howard University, where Ms. Holloman had taught so devotedly for many years. Donations in Ms. Holloman's memory may be made to the FMMC Foundation to support next year's upcoming International Competition for Voice or to the Smithsonian Museum of African American History and Culture that is scheduled to open next year on the Mall.

She is currently a student of Roberto Diaz and HsinYun Huang at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia. In 2014, she won the Greenfield Music Competition, and performed the Walton Viola Concerto with the Philadelphia Orchestra in April 2015.


Ms. Lee began studying the viola when she was eight, and entered the Juilliard Pre-College Program at the age of nine with Toby Appel as her mentor. During her time at Juilliard she won first place at the New York International Competition, and at the Alex & Buono International String Competition. In 2010, her family relocated to Seoul, South Korea, where she continued her studies with SoonWha Oh at the Korean National University of the Arts. During that time, she won first place in numerous competitions and performed at many prestigious venues. She relocated to Philadelphia in 2013 and was admitted to Curtis at the age of 13.

All three winners will perform—**Lara Boschkor**, first-prize violin; **Hae Sue Lee**, first prize viola; and **Zlatomir Fung**, first-prize cello; with **Frank**

Conlon, collaborative pianist. The program includes works by Brahms, Carter, Debussy, Paganini, Tsinsadze, and Wieniawski. In addition, **Lara Boschkor** will perform the World Premiere of the work commissioned for the 2015 JIC, **"Shades of Red,"** by **David Froom.**

Violinist Lara Boschkor, 15, won first prize violin and \$10,000 at the **2015 Johan**sen International Competition for Young String Players. She came to wide

attention at the age of 13 in 2013 when she won first prize at the 7th Henryk Szeryng International Violin Competition in Mexico, as well as first prize at the 12th Carl Flesch International Violin Competition in Hungary.

Ms. Boschkor was born in Germany in October 1999, and is of German-Hungarian parentage. She began her violin studies at the age of four, and won first prize at several European competitions at an early age. In 2012, she won first prize at the Jeunesses International Violin Competition in Bucharest, Romania. That same year, she became the youngest prize winner at the 19th International Brahms Violin Competition in Austria. In 2013, she was invited to perform the Tchaikovsky Violin Concerto in Japan with the Osaka Symphony Orchestra and conductor Yuki Miyagi.

Ms. Boschkor started her studies at an early age at the Precollege Division of the Hochschule für Musik Cologne and Detmold, and then went on to study with Liviu Prunaru at the Conservatorium van Amsterdam. Other important musical mentors include Erik Schumann at Hochschule für Musik Frankfurt and Kolja Blacher at Hochschule für Musik Hanns Eisler Berlin. She has received support from the Bruno Frey Foundation and the Foundation Deutsche Stiftung Musikleben. She plays on a 1740 Carlo Antonio Testore violin generously loaned by the Foundation Stiftung Musikleben.

Violist **Hae Sue Lee**, 15, won first prize viola and \$10,000 at the **2015 JIC.** She is currently a student of Roberto Diaz and HsinYun Huang at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia. In 2014, she won the Greenfield Music Competition, and performed the Walton Viola Concerto with the Philadelphia Orchestra in April 2015 at the age of 15.

Ms. Lee began studying the viola when she was eight, and entered the Juilliard Pre-College Program at the age of nine with Toby Appel as her mentor. During her time at Juilliard she won first place at the New York International Competition, and at the Alex & Buono International String Competition. In 2010, her family relocated to Seoul, South Korea, where she continued her studies with SoonWha Oh at the Korean National University of the Arts. During that time she won first place in numerous competitions and performed at numerous prestigious venues. She relocated to Philadelphia in 2013 and was admitted to Curtis at the age of 13.

Cellist **Zlatomir Fung,** 15, won first prize cello and \$10,000 at the **2015 JIC.** He is a student of Richard Aaron and Julie Albers (second prize winner of the very first JIC in 1997), and studies chamber music at the New England Conservatory Preparatory School.

Mr. Fung won gold medals at the 2014 Stulberg String Competition and the 29th Irving Klein Competition, and placed second in the cello division of the 20th International Brahms Competition in Portschach, Austria in 2013. In 2012, he was the silver medal winner of the cello division of the Seventh International Tchaikovsky Competition for Young Musicians in Montreux-Vevey, Switzerland. He has appeared on NPR's "From the Top" four times.

Mr. Fung has won numerous other prizes, including the 2014 Boston Symphony Concerto Competition. He has appeared as soloist with a number of orchestras, including the Grand Rapids Symphony, Symphony Pro Musica, the New England Philharmonic, Pro Arte Chamber Orchestra and others. He has studied at the Heifetz International Music Institute, Indiana Summer Strings Academy, Luzerne Music Center, Greenwood Music Camp, MusicAlp and the Aspen Music Festival and School. Outside of music, he enjoys philosophy, literature and plays competitive chess.
