elcome to the Club's 130th season, now underway with public performances recommencing in September. Avanti's first concert is September 30, featuring 2016 Johansen International Competition Winner Lara Boschkor.

The FMMC Chorale is planning a special event for its first concerts, January 13 and 14. The Chorale will perform a cantata that was originally composed by Stephen Douglas Burton for the Club's 100th Anniversary. The cantata is based on Martin Luther King's "I Have a Dream" speech and Mr. Burton has graciously offered the music for this Chorale performance. (He will also attend one or both performances with 9 members of his family.) The performance will honor the late long-term Club member and former Foundation Chair, soprano Charlotte Holloman. This performance will be special because it is close to Reverend King's birthday and will mark the end of the Obama Administration. We hope you will put this on your calendar.

Another important date for your calendar is Friday, October 7 – the Club's opening Friday concert at Calvary Baptist Church, followed by the President's Reception. Both the Club and Foundation Boards will be meeting at Calvary Baptist that morning and attendees will be able



to meet most of them at the reception. Please plan to attend – we'd love to see you.

Following-up on the report in the September Newsletter, the large ensemble get-together for the Schubert Octet and Beethoven Septet was a great success. We had 5 violins, 3 violas, 2 cellos and 2 basses, playing opposite 3 clarinets, 2 bassoons and one French horn. Schubert and Beethoven managed to emerge to general satisfaction as ears accustomed themselves to the acoustics. I welcome suggestions for other larger chamber pieces that members

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Where They Are Now


ccording to his Web biography, Santiago Cañón Valencia, the Johansen International Competition (JIC) 2012 Second Prize winner in cello, was born in Bogota in 1995. He has been praised as one of the most promising young cellists of his generation. His major musical mentors have been Henryk Zarzycki in Colombia, James Tennant in New Zealand, and Andres Diaz in the USA. He will start his master's degree with Wolfgang Emanuel Schmidt at the Hochschule für Musik Franz Liszt Weimar in October 2016. Santiago began winning major prizes in international competitions at the age of 11, including Carlos Prieto (2006), Adam (2009), Beijing (2010), Gisborne (2011), Johansen (2012), Cassadó (2013), Lennox, Lynn Harrel and Casals (2014). He recently won the first prize at the VIII Carlos Prieto International Violoncello Competition 2016 in Morelia, México that included a \$10,000 prize, as well as CD and concert opportunities.

Cañón Valencia has performed with orchestras throughout Australasia, South America, the USA, Canada, South Africa, Europe, China, Japan, México, and Russia, and has played as a soloist with Yuri Bashmet and the Moscow Soloists as well as the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra. He has collaborated with world-renowned musicians such as Alisa Weilerstein, Shlomo Mintz, Dmitri Berlinsky, Richard Young, Andres Diaz, Emmanuel Ceysson, Wendy Chen, Roberto Gonzales-Monjas, and Katherine Austin among others. Santiago has also shared the stage with Maxim Vengerov, Li-Wei Qin and Phillipe Müller.

Santiago has been a guest artist several times at the Cartagena International Music Festival and is one of eight cellists selected worldwide to attend the Verbier Festival Academy 2016.

We recently caught up with Santiago just after he performed the opening recital for the International Waikato Cello Festival. A reviewer had this to say about his performance: "And then there was Kodaly and his Sonata for solo cello, Op.8. Quite suddenly, it became clear that we had access to a demonstration of expertise with the bow, which became a master class in its own right. In it, our cellist introduced a remarkable vocabulary of bow movements associated with clear intention and effect." Santiago tells us, "Being a prize winner at the JIC competition

means a lot to me because it's a great acknowledgment of all the hard work put in over years of practice. Getting to meet the competitors and playing for such a distinguished panel of judges was a great experience and receiving a prize at



such a prestigious competition really means so much to me."

We are always curious about our winners' instruments. Santiago told us he is playing on a cello made by Wayne Burak given to him by his teacher Andres Diaz. The bow he uses is made by Alessandro Alberi Salo, an excellent Colombian luthier.

Strad Magazine and others have praised his debut CD of solo 20th Century works. Consecutively, he has just released two new recordings consisting of Russian cello sonatas and popular pieces of the cello repertoire with pianist Katherine Austin. All of his recordings have been made under the Atoll label in New Zealand.

Santiago has been sponsored by the Mayra & Edmundo Esquenazi Scholarship through the Salvi Foundation since 2011 and is a recipient of the MPower ArtistGrants 2016 by the Sphinx Organization.

Featuring a Young FMMC Member: Joe Broom

You may be interested in knowing about the young man who performed at our Annual Meeting and Luncheon last April. Joe Broom was the First Prize Winner of the Ross-Roberts Woodwind Brass & Percussion competition in 2015.

Joe is the Euphonium Artist 2016 Gold Medalist of the prestigious Leonard Falcone International Euphonium and Tuba Festival. He is also a musician who lays claim to a number of firsts for euphonium players including: being the featured performer in the University of Michigan 2016 Collage Concert where he won the Gottlieb Variations Award for exemplary performance, a United States Presidential Scholar in the Arts (2015), and a 2015 Davidson Fellow. Joe also won a seat in the National Symphony Orchestra Youth Fellowship Program.

In 2013, Joe became the youngest National YoungArts Week winner in music — selected from more than 10,000 applicants. He was the first high school student selected to compete in the Artist Division finals of the International Tuba Euphonium Association solo competition, and the first brass musician to earn a Bacardi Fallon Performing Arts Scholarship — competing with string, voice, and piano students. Before his 2016 historic win as the youngest Euphonium Artist Falcone Gold Medalist in 2014, he was the first high school student selected as a semifinalist in the Artist Division of the Festival.

Joe has performed as soloist with the "President's Own" United States Marine Band and the United States Air Force Band. In 2014, he was a featured soloist on National Public Radio's *From the Top*, where host Christopher O'Riley described him as "an outstanding musician advocate." He was invited back to the show in 2016 to perform the broadcast premiere of *Song of the Ancients*, a new euphonium piece composed by his University of Michigan fellow student, Kara Schubring.

Joe believes every artist's work can move beyond the stage, page, or gallery and into education and community engagement. Most recently, this vision was supported by the University of Michigan's Excellence in Entrepreneurship, Career Empowerment, and Leadership (EXCEL) program when he was selected to be a 2016 EXCEL Fellow as founder of Chamber Unique (ChU)TM. ChU is a network of artists who collaborate to use the power of the arts to ensure broader access and to strengthen communities. The EXCEL Fellowship allowed ChU to expand beyond it's Virginia-based projects and form a partnership with Crescendo Detroit, an organization changing lives of young people in Detroit, by combining high expectations with access to the arts.

From his solo work to his collaborative arts projects with communities across the country, Joe seeks to expand his personal artistic horizons and those of other artists across all disciplines. For two seasons, in Washington, DC, ChU partnered with the Iona Senior Services Weinberg Wellness & Arts Center to create a performance series. This partnership helped bridge the gap between musicians and senior communities with passion and joy. Through a Virginia-based initiative, ChU adds the arts to STEM studies (science, technology, engineering, and math). The project, Full STEAM Ahead, presents topics such as neuroscience, quantum mechanics, and astrophysics using the arts to make these subjects exciting, accessible, and fun for students.

A graduate of Thomas Jefferson High School for Science & Technology in Virginia, Joe now attends the University of Michigan on academic and music merit scholarships. He studies with international euphonium soloist and Besson/Buffet Crampon Ambassador Steven Mead and with Fritz Kaenzig who is an Arthur F. Thorn Professor of Tuba & Euphonium University of Michigan School of Music, Theatre & Dance. He is a Performing Artist for Besson Euphoniums.

Orchestra Players Wanted for Chorale Rehearsals

Thile the Chorale begins preparations on October 16, 2016 for its first concert of the year, the orchestra will begin its rehearsals on November 7. Rehearsals will be held at the Sanctuary of the Church of the Reformation, 212 East Capitol St. NE, Washington, DC. The first concert will feature an all-American program and will include Stephan Burton's I Have a Dream cantata (commission by the Club as part of its 100th Anniversary Celebration), Bernstein's Chichester Psalms, and Barber's Agnus Dei (which was set to the score of his Adagio for Strings). The concerts will take place on January 13 and 14, 2017 at the Church of the Reformation, Washington, DC.

Both Chorale selections require substantial percussion section to support the composers' scoring. While we already have identified our timpanist, there is a need to cover the remaining instrumentation including xylophone, glockenspiel, and celesta. Masterworks of Chamber Music at the Smithsonian

The Smithsonian Associates, in collaboration with the Friday Morning Music Club, will offer a six-week course exploring the "Masterworks of Chamber Music." In this lively and engaging series, FMMC pianist Frank Conlon will focus on: the economical and personal nature of duos and sonatas (Oct. 19), the string quartets' perfect blend of tone and ensembles (Oct. 26), the balance and contrast of sound achieved in the pairing of piano and strings (Nov. 2), the sound

created by the combination of bowed or plucked string instruments with woodwind, brass and piano (Nov. 9), and the addition of the voice to the instrumental mix (Nov. 16 and 30). Each class lecture is highlighted by music, video recordings and live chamber performances of some of the great works written for chamber repertoire by FMMC musicians arranged by Frank and Jeongseon Choi.



Nadir Khashimov's expressive and charismatic style has made him one of the most accomplished and versatile violinists on the international music scene today. He won first prize as well as the audience prize in the Friday Morning Music Club's 2015 Washington International Competition. In 2006 at the age of just 16, Mr. Khashimov won the 2nd prize at the prestigious Paganini Competition in Moscow. Subsequently, he has won major competitions such as Sarasate in Spain, George Enescu in Romania, Washington International in US, Michael Hill in New Zealand, and Yankelevitch in Russia among others. Regarded by the press as a masterful virtuoso with a powerful and touching tone, Mr. Khashimov has appeared as soloist with orchestras such as the Philadelphia Orchestra, National Orchestra of Russia, Moscow Philharmonic Orchestra, and the London Symphony Orchestra. CD Review

Carlisle Floyd, Wuthering Heights Reference Recordings (2-CD set)

he Florentine Opera gave me my first experience with live opera as a child in Milwaukee many years ago. So too, my first experience with live professional orchestral music was with the Milwaukee Symphony. Thus, I was glad to revisit the Florentine Opera and the Milwaukee Symphony in this new world premiere recording of Carlisle Floyd's music drama Wuthering Heights. Floyd (b. 1926) is best known for his American-themed operas including Susannah and Of Mice and Men. He set Emily Bronte's novel, Wuthering Heights to music in 1958 following the success of Susannah, and wrote the libretto as well as the score. The work received its first performance in July 1958 from the Santa Fe Opera, but it has been performed infrequently since then. The Florentine Opera presented the work in a concert version in 2015.

Floyd's opera tells a wildly romantic tale of passion, loss, jealousy, and revenge. Consisting of a Prelude and three Acts, the opera tells of the doomed love between Catherine Earnshaw and Heathcliff, who has been found as an abandoned baby in London and ad-

opted by Catherine's father. Cathy and Heathcliff grow up together, but Catherine marries Edgar Linton on a neighboring moor in search of financial security and a sophisticated life. Three years after the marriage, Heathcliff returns as a professional gambler. He wins Wuthering Heights in a card game but Cathy refuses to run away with him. When Cathy dies in childbirth, she haunts Heathcliff forever.

The opera is cast as a music drama with no distinct separation between aria and recitative sections. The music is visceral, accessible, and full of the wild dissonances that capture the passion of the story. The large orchestral writing features brass and percussion. There are climactic sections for Cathy as a soloist and in passages and duets with Heathcliff.

The work is written for nine characters with short roles for chorus. Soprano Georgia Jarman offers a highly emotive performance as Catherine — a role with many high notes and changes of mood. Joseph Mechavich conducts.

I loved hearing this opera and loved thinking about Milwaukee and the Florentine Opera again. The Florentines, the Milwaukee Symphony, and Milwaukee have much to do with my lifelong love of music. The 2-CD set includes a libretto together with an interview with Carlisle Floyd.

The Club is sad to announce the passing of long-term Club member (and 2010 Honorary Member) Hilda Seibel on the morning of May 28, 2016 at the age of 91. Starting in the 60's when she joined the Club, Hilda played violin and viola in the FMMC orchestra, hosted many Club social events, and was an active chamber and free-lance musician. Hilda was a lover of both classical and popular music, and played in restaurants, at parties, at schools, retirement and nursing homes, and hospitals, as well as in more formal classical settings. She was a member of the Johansen International Competition Committee when that competition began in 1997 and was an active volunteer for the Club – always ready to help whenever asked. Everyone who knew her remembers her enormous enthusiasm and sense of humor. Later in life, Hilda developed a congenital eye disease, but compensated by learning enormous amounts of music by heart so that she could continue to play – often together with a guitarist. She always communicated a great sense of fun to her audiences. Judy Shapiro remembers playing the Martinu violin/viola duo with Hilda, in what she believes was Hilda's last FMMC performance.

According to her obituary in the Washington Post, "Music was her passion. Her coveted quartet music stand now lives with the Stradivarius string instruments at the Library of Congress."

Hilda was a fiercely independent woman who dressed simply and hated wearing shoes. She traveled the world stepping on every continent except Australia, but Chevy Chase [Somerset] was always her home. Her love for her community and her passion for music fit well with the Friendship Heights Community Center and this gathering area was a centerpiece in her life. Music will be played in her honor at the community center for many months to come. The family requests that her memory be honored by supporting the music programs at the Village of Friendship Heights Community Center, 4433 S. Park Ave., Chevy Chase, MD 20815.

Hilda was a remarkable example of the kind of person who built the Friday Morning Music Club, who have helped define its spirit, and who have kept it flourishing for so many years. She is certainly missed.
