

JICWinners to Perform in Upcoming Concerts

The FMMC Foundation and the Johansen International Competition for Young String Players (Ages 13-17) are proud to present three concerts in October 2018 with winners of the 2018 JIC.

On Friday, October 5, 2018, at 12 Noon, Michał Balas and Krzysztof Michalski, who shared the first prize for cello at the 2018 JIC, will perform at the Arts Club of Washington, 2017 I Street NW, Washington, DC. Frank Conlon will

be the collaborative pianist. The program will include works by Chopin, Schubert, and Sarasate. The concert is free and open to the public. Thanks are due to the Polish American Arts Association for facilitating this recital for our cello winners.

On **Sunday**, October 7, 2018, at 5 PM, all four 2018 first-prize winners will perform at the 2018 JIC Winners' Recital as part of the Roth Concert Series at Church of the Annunciation, 3810 Massachusetts Avenue NW, Washington, DC. Admission is free. Performers include Julian Rhee, first-prize Performing Arts Center, 15200 Annapolis Road, Bowie, MD, under the baton of Music Director Jesus Manuel Berard. Other works on the Prince George's Philharmonic program include *Pageant and Proclamation* (1997) by George Walker, and Schumann's Symphony No. 3 in E flat major, op. 97, the "Rhenish." A limited number of tickets are available free to FMMC members. FMMC members may reserve complimentary tickets by contactPhilharmonic, performing the spectacular Tchaikovsky Concerto—my favorite of all time! Participating at the JIC in 2015 was the first year I had ever traveled to the East Coast, and now three years later, when I return to perform in October, it will be my 10th trip! This time I hope to tour the White House because I am a huge fan of the show *The West Wing*."

These winners all have impressive resumes with many achievements be-

> hind them. Julian Rhee, 18, also won several prizes at the 2018 Irving M. Klein International String Competition, including a prize for the best performance of solo Bach, one for best performance of the commissioned work, and the overall second prize in the competition. Also this year, he was named a Finalist Winner of the 2018 National YoungArts Foundation, performing at the New World Center in Miami and the John F. Kennedy Center. Most recently, Julian was the winner of the 2018 Aspen Music Festival Violin Concerto Competition and performed as the guest soloist

with the Aspen Philharmonic Orchestra at the Benedict Music Tent. He was a recipient

of the Dorothy Richard Starling Foundation Scholarship and studied with Robert Lipsett and Sylvia Rosenberg at the Aspen Music Festival. He has performed as soloist with a number of orchestras, including the Milwaukee and Pittsburgh Symphonies. Julian studied with Almita and Roland Vamos and Hye-Sun Lee as a scholarship recipient at the Music Institute of Chicago's Academy. He is a graduate of Brookfield East High School where he was Class President and Valedictorian and was the 2018 U.S. Presidential Scholar.

A native of Chicago, Illinois, 15-yearold **Beatrice Chen** was accepted into the

Michał Balas, who won the prize for the best performance of Joel Philip Friedman's commissioned work *Johansen*, will perform its world premiere. Frank Conlon will be the collaborative pianist. In addition to the Friedman work, the program includes music by Bach, Wieniawski, Sarasate, Brahms, Schubert, and Chopin.

Charlotte was a finalist in the 2015 JIC when she was 13 years old. We're so glad she returned! She recently gave us her thoughts on her JIC experiences:

Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia at age 14. She currently studies viola with Hsin-Yun Huang. Chen has won first prize in various competitions including the Johansen International Competition for Young String Players, DePaul Concerto Festival, CYSO Concerto Competition, American Protege International Concerto Competition, and the Society of American Musicians Competition. She appeared as a soloist with the Vicente Chamber Orchestra of Santa Monica, Chicago Youth Symphony Orchestra, and twice with the Oistrakh Symphony Orchestra. In the 2018-2019 season, she will make her debut with the Sinfonietta DuPage and the Capital City Symphony in Washington, DC. Beatrice has been featured on the Young Steinway Concert Series of Skokie, Show 347 of NPR's From the Top, twice on WFMT's Introductions, three times at Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall, and many times at the Harris Concert Hall in Aspen. Additionally, she has given numerous solo and chamber music recitals in churches, schools, and retirement homes throughout the Chicago area. Beatrice participated in the Young Performers Program at the Music@Menlo Chamber Music Festival and Institute of 2016. She also studied at the Aspen Music Festival and School for the past three summers, where she played in the 2017 Finckel-Wu Han Chamber Music Studio. As a former member of the Ambassador and New World String Quartets, she performed live on WFMT, at Symphony Center, and at various public schools. Prior to studying at Curtis, she was principal violist of the Chicago Youth Symphony Orchestras for five years and studied with Paul Neubauer and Matthew Lipman. Beatrice plays on a 2015 viola made by Keisuke Hori.

Michał Balas is the first-prize winner of nine national and international cello competitions for young musicians and regularly participates in prominent cello masterclasses in Poland. Michał enjoyed several solo presentations awarded to him by the International Kazimierz Wilkomirski Cello Competition for Young Musicians in Poznan, Poland (December 2016), including solo performances with the Philharmonic Orchestra in Kalisz

and the symphony orchestra at his home school in Krakow. Michał's solo orchestral debut took place in 2014 during the inauguration of the prestigious 40th Jubilee International Lancut Masterclasses for String Players, where he performed with Philharmonic Orchestra in Rzeszow (Filharmonia Podkarpacka). Michał is an alumnus of the Morningside Music Bridge Program in 2015 (Mount Royal University in Calgary, Canada) and 2017 (New England Conservatory in Boston, MA, USA), receiving a scholarship from the Ministry of Culture of the Republic of Poland. He began his cello education at the age of 6 in Krakow, Poland, at the

Primary Ignacy Jan Paderewski Music School. At the age of 9 he moved with his parents to Washington, DC, and continued his education with Cecylia Barczyk, professor at Towson University. After returning to Poland he became a student in the class of professor Stanislaw Firlej (Academy of Music in Lodz) at the Secondary Music School in Krakow. He is a scholar of the Pro Musica Bona Foundation.

Krzysztof Michalski is from Tarnobrzeg, Poland, and attends the M. Kopernik high school and the Władysław Żeleński Secondary Music School in Kracow. He has been playing cello and piano since he was 6 years old. His cello teacher since 2013 has been Henryk Zarzycki, who also has taught Santiago Cañón Valencia (Johansen International Competition second-prize cello winner in 2012). He has won prizes in several national and international cello competitions, including the XI National Competition for Young Cellists in Wrocław, 2015; the I Karol Szymanowski's National Competition for Young Musical Individualists in villa ATMA, Zakopane, 2016; the National Competition CEA for students of secondary music schools in Warsaw, 2016; the VII National Competition for Cellists in Sochaczew, 2017; the International Competition for String Instruments in Elblag, 2017; and the International Competition "Talents for Europe" in Dolny Kubin, Slovakia, 2017. He has performed as a soloist with symphony and chamber orchestras in Poland, Germany, and South America and several recitals with piano accompaniment. Since 2015 he has been a soloist and concertmaster of the Talent Orchestra at the Krzysztof Penderecki European Center of Music. He is a double scholarship recipient of the Minister of Culture and National Heritage, of Subcarpatian Voivodeship, of the Lesser Poland Scholarship Fund "Sapere auso," and of the Pro Musica Bona Foundation. In 2017 he was awarded the prize "Young Poland 2017." He took part in Morningside Music Bridge program in Boston, Massachusetts, in 2017 and in Warsaw, Poland, in 2018; in the latter he won third prize in the Concerto Competition. He plays on contemporary copies of M. Goffriller's instruments by Cracow violin maker J. Pawlikowski and Zakopian violin maker W.Topa.

In addition to her success at the March 2018 JIC, **Charlotte Marckx** won the Gold Medal and Bach Prize at the 2018 Stulberg International Strings Competition in May 2018. In 2017 she was awarded first place in the Music Teachers National Association National Strings Competition. A multi-genre violinist, Charlotte has performed and recorded with Time for Three and Pink Martini and has been featured in *Strings*

magazine and on NPR's From the Top. She has performed concertos with many orchestras, including the Seattle Symphony, and as the Grand Prize winner of the KING FM Young Artists Awards, she was chosen by James Ehnes to perform a recital with the Seattle Chamber Music Society. Charlotte currently studies with Simon James and is honored to also work with Robert Lipsett. Former teachers include Jan Coleman and Paul Kantor. Upcoming performances, in addition to the one with Prince George's Philharmonic, include the Kirkland Civic Orchestra, the Kalamazoo Symphony Orchestra, the Baltimore Chamber Orchestra (2019-2020 season), and the Port Angeles Symphony. Together with her cellist sister, Olivia, the duo called Sempre Sisters (https://sempresisters. com), recently produced a multi-genre CD. Charlotte is appreciative of support from the Jack Kent Cook Foundation and the Dorothy Richard Starling Foundation.

Margot Neuhof Collins, born December 26, 1923, in Stuttgart, Germany, to Ludwig and Elisabeth Neuhof, passed peacefully in her Maryland home on August 20, 2018. Margot was a professional violinist, a teacher, and an advocate for music in schools. Margot's musical career spanned nine decades; she began playing violin as a young child in Germany, graduated cum laude from the Royal Academy of Music for violin in England, and later received a Masters in Music from the University of Maryland. Her professional career included performing in symphonies including the Dallas Symphony Orchestra, Houston Symphony, and the National Symphony Orchestra, playing in and organizing chamber music ensembles

including the Belmont String Quartet, which performed classical music through the Concerts in the Schools program. Margot taught violin and viola at universities, community colleges, and in her private studio. Margot's deep love and devotion to family extended to the many friends, colleagues, and students who frequented her home. The door was always open and music filled the rooms. Margot traveled widely, trekking in Nepal, Alaska, and Europe, and was passionate about hiking and sailing. Her adventurous spirit, musical talent and joie de vivre continues in her children and the many people whose lives she touched. She is survived by her three children Joanie, Robert and Elizabeth, grandchildren Alexandra and Shane, and great grandchildren Sawyer and Jaxon. A private memorial will be held in the future for family and friends to remember this extraordinary woman.
