elcome to the start of a New Year with its promise of renewed energy and enthusiasm to face the challenges and opportunities ahead. Speaking of challenges, what have you been doing to meet our goal of attending more FMMC concerts this year? With all the exciting offerings of the past few months, we hope you are well on your way to meeting your quota.

Winter, despite the impediments the weather may sometimes present, is actually a delightful time to attend a concert. What better way to lift your spirits and warm your heart.

One of the first opportunities to attend a great concert will take place on Thursday January 16 and Saturday January 18 when our Arioso Chorale and Orchestra will present Verdi's 1874 choral masterpiece, his Requiem. Paul Leavitt will lead the performances at 8:00 PM at the Church of the Reformation, featuring four outstanding soloists. You will want to put this on top of your list if you haven't already.

Plans for an exciting weekend of events are also in the works for February, when the nationally renowned and highly regarded Cavani Quartet comes to present both an afternoon recital on Saturday February 22 and a master class on Sunday 23 under the auspices of the FMMC. The Saturday concert will take place at 3:00 PM in the Hammer Auditorium at the Corcoran Gallery and will also feature violist Samuel Rosenthal, a 2018 Johansen International Competition for Young String Players winner. They will be playing music by Beethoven and Mendelssohn in memory of Irene Wise, a long time



dedicated violinist and FMMC member who passed away this summer.

The Sunday master class will take place in another exceptional venue, the new REACH of the Kennedy Center, in the Justice Forum. The event will start at 1:30 PM and will feature four winners of recent FMMC High School Competitions for Strings as participants. Miyabi Hendrickson, violin, Zoe Fong, violin, Pablo Ronderos, viola and Colin Hill, cello and the local student ensembles they participate in will each bring a work to be critiqued by the Cavani. We are especially gratified that the Frances Kaplan Memorial Fund is underwriting this special event. Mrs. Kaplan credited her exposure to, and participation in playing, chamber music while she was growing up with her life-long dedication to music. We are confident she would appreciate FMMC's encouraging these talented students as a worthwhile use of her bequest.

Both the concert and the master class, like all FMMC events, are open to the public at no cost and should provide inspiration to everyone, though perhaps young string students most especially.

As we are getting ready to launch our perhaps long overdue Legacy Society, I would like to point out that there could be no better way to memorialize these two devoted musicians, Irene Wise and Frances Kaplan, than through sharing the enrichment music brought to them their entire lives. We encourage our members to consider their example.

Our panel of judges for the semi-final and final rounds include three internationally acclaimed pianists and teachers – Simone Dinnerstein, Robert McDonald, and John Perry.


Last month began with an inspiring master class on December 2 at the International

Piano Archives Performing Arts Library at the University of Maryland by Ann Shein. She is a highly esteemed pianist and pedagogue and honorary and life member of the FMMC who has funded the third prize of our piano competition for many years. Three exceptionally talented performers from the FMMC participated: Sasha Beresovsky played Fauré's Nocturnes, op. 33, no. 1 and op. 36, no. 4, Keng Siong Sim played Rachmaninoff's Moment

Musicale, op. 16, no. 3, and Yuri Chayama played Chopin's Barcarolle, op. 60. All three presented highly polished performances, and Ann delved into subtleties such as rhythmic pacing, harmonic voicing, and tonal and dynamic nuances. All present were moved by her keen artistic insights and compassionate instruction. Earlier this year she was honored with a Lifetime Achieve-

ment in the Performing Arts by the National Museum of Women in the Arts here in Washington, and in March of this year she will celebrate her 80th birthday with an all-Chopin recital at Carnegie's Weill Recital Hall.

On December 15, we were treated to a concert by Julian Rhee, the first-prize violin winner of our 2018 Johansen International Competition



for Young String Players, and pianist Dina Vainshtein at Annunciation Catholic Church, featuring major works by Bach, Beethoven, Brahms, Saint-Saëns, and Kreisler.

We look forward to many more musical treats in 2020, and we wish all of you a most

Happy New Year filled with happiness, good health, and many blessings.

The Chorale is busily rehearsing for its second concert of the season that will take place on January 16 and January 18, at 8 PM at the Church of the Reformation. The Chorale will perform Verdi's *Messa de Requiem*.

Verdi's best-known works are his many operas with their dramatic use of f fortissimo juxtaposed with the softest of pianissimo passages. The Requiem follows this tradition and demands much of the soloists, the chorus, and the orchestra. To accomplish this, Mr. Leavitt has asked four particularly talented soloists to take center stage for these performances. Soprano Alyssa Cox, Mezzo Elizabeth Mondragon, Tenor Patrick Cook and Bass John Scherch will take their place in front of the orchestra and a chorus of over 60 voices. It promises to be a memorable performance. As with all FMMC concerts, the event is free and open to the public.

FMMC Welcomes Ingleside at King Farm as its Latest Venue

Starting April 1, 2020, a concert at Ingleside at King Farm (IKF) will inaugurate a new FMMC chamber concert venue. The premiere concert has been planned for April 1, 2020, with a program featuring solo guitar, a piano trio, and a clarinet quintet. FMMC members, Judy and Paul Silverman, have been selected as co-chairs of the venue. They plan to schedule four chamber concerts a year, spaced quarterly.

Ingleside at King Farm (IKF) is a continuing care retirement community, located less than a mile from the Shady Grove Metro stop. It has recently been approved as a performance venue. The beautiful Cultural Arts Center opened in 2019 and has a 300-seat capacity, a concert stage, and a fine Estonia piano. A second residential building opened in late 2019, bringing the combined community population to about 500 residents.

Ingleside is located at 701 King Farm Blvd. in Rockville and street parking, as well as parking areas behind and to the sides of the building, are available free of charge. FMMC members are welcome to attend along with IKF residents and the general public.
