# From the President

It is a good feeling to share with you our initial steps in resuming our activities. Though circumstances have not permitted us to go from zero to 60 in record time, gradual progress is still intrinsically satisfying and encouraging.

The Avanti Orchestra under Pablo Saelzer's leadership led off the season by hosting an open rehearsal on Thursday, September 16th at the Church of the Epiphany. Approximately 45 invited friends and family attended and heard about 40 orchestra players, consisting of strings, woodwinds, and horns. The program was a mixed bag of audience pleasers by Bach, Corelli, Beethoven, Brahms and Stravinsky. All participants and audience members were vaccinated and the audience members and all string players were masked as an additional precaution. We commend Avanti for setting a high standard for returning to safe in-person musical events.

The Arioso Chorale is experimenting with how to achieve safety for its scheduled performances of Messiah highlights in mid-October. Most likely these will have been turned into friend and family gatherings as well. Though after a recent Sunday afternoon outdoor rehearsal in front of Reformation Lutheran Church on Capitol Hill that was greeted with great enthusiasm by neighborhood passersby, neighbors will also be included in the mix. We are so grateful for the vigilant efforts on the part of Paul Leavitt, our Arioso Conductor, and Pablo, to help us gather together safely.

As an important reminder, every FMMC member who participates in any activity must be fully vaccinated. We anticipate that by the time of our next



group event, our long-awaited luncheon on November 19th, many of you will have received a booster shot, for an additional layer of safety.

Please join us at DACOR Bacon House on Friday, November 19th.

The reservation form is here in the Newsletter, and you will have received notification electronically as well. You have the option of registering on-line or by mail. The luncheon committee has been hard at work putting together a memorable event which will include performances on Mrs. Bacon's Steinway piano, which had been played by Arthur Rubenstein when he stayed there as her guest. We will be entertained by Grace McFarlane (playing Chopin) and high school woodwind competition winner Krystal Wu, accompanied by Jeongseon Choi (playing a Concert Fantasia on motifs from Rigoletto by Luigi Bassi).



# FMMC's Composers and Composers Group

Composers have been strongly represented in our membership ever since 1892, when the multi-talented Maud Sewall joined the fledgling Club. She had studied violin as a child when her family lived in Europe and continued with Josef Kaspar after moving to the Washington area. A "tiny woman of many talents," she was also a composer and a pianist as well as a self-taught organist who later became a Fellow in the American Guild of Organists. Her essays on sonata form written for the Club's academic lectures were published in 1894 in the *Musical Courier* magazine.

Decades later. Ms. Sewall was still an active FMMC member. In March 1950, the Club hosted a concert in her honor at the Church of the Holy City, a mile north of the White House on 16th Street. The Club's printed program included the following tribute: "Today we are privileged to dedicate this program to one who has served our club since 1892, not only as a faithful member, but also as a violinist, a composer, and a musicologist. Since her father, Dr. Frank Sewall, assisted in designing this sanctuary and served as its first pastor for 27 years, and as she assisted him as director-organist and continued through a period of fifty years, this setting has been chosen to honor our own 'Miss Maudie' Maud Gilchrist Sewall." The concert featured a performance of Ms. Sewall's Quatrains from Omar Khayyam composed that year and sung by the FMMC chorus.

Mary Howe, another remarkable FMMC composer, started in 1914 as an FMMC solo and chamber pianist and also performed as a duo-pianist with Anne Hull of Baltimore. She had studied piano privately at Peabody with Ernest Hutcheson and in Dresden, Germany, with Richard Burmeister when she traveled abroad with her mother after her father's death. She married in 1912 and began raising a family while continuing to perform in private recitals. Her compositions appeared on the Club's programs starting at least in 1919. In 1922, she earned a degree in composition from Peabody, studying with Gustave Strube. In 1925, an entire FMMC program was given over to her

compositions for piano, voice, and cello, with the composer herself performing at the piano.

In December 1921, FMMC presented its first composers concert, showcasing compositions by seven Washington composers, all active Club members. By 1930, the Club had instituted a Composer membership category, attainable by submitting compositions to a special committee for review and approval.

The FMMC Composers Group was formally organized in 1943 by Elizabeth Butterfield and began presenting annual programs. In 1946, Miriam Hilton started a competition within the Composers Group, offering an award of \$25 for a piece based on a poem by the late FMMC President, Alice Byrnes. This annual competition within the group continued for many years, with the compositional requirements changed each year.

FMMC's 75th-anniversary events in 1960 included a cheerful operetta, *Now That We Are Seventy-Five*, depicting the Club's history. Members of the Composers Group wrote the original music, and the cast included members from all groups of FMMC.

In 1969, the Composers Group submitted a program to the National Federation of Music Clubs for the American Women Composers award and won first place in the Capitol District, which it did again in 1970, 1973, *and* 1975!

In April 1986, George Manos, Music Director of the National Gallery of Art, presented a program of seven FMMC composers: Esther Ballou, Edwin Earle Ferguson, Genevieve Fritter, Mary Howe, Winifred Hyson, Ruth Norman, and Natalia Raigorodsky in the gallery's East Garden Court. Ruth Norman was an inspiring colleague in the 1980s who focused on African-Americans in classical music. She introduced works by Black composers along with her own compositions, moving seamlessly among performing, composition, scholarship, and teaching.

Last season, the Club commissioned two of our current composers—Mark Simon and Jonathan Newmark—to write the opening and closing music for our 135th-anniversary broadcast. Both string quartet pieces played to the FMMC occasion using musical techniques. Mr. Simon's piece, *Friday Morning*, was based on a four-note motif derived from the Club's initials—F and C being notes of the scale, and the two M's becoming *mi*, the solfège syllable for the note E. Mr. Newmark's piece, *Outro* 135, was written in 7/8 tempo throughout, with rhythmic emphasis on beats 1, 3, and 5.

Today, our 25-member Composers Group presents several well-attended concerts each year, often using FMMC performance members to play their compositions. This season, four concerts are scheduled, for December 15, January 20, February 16, and April 21.

Recordings of Composers Group concerts from the 1960's to about 2010 have been digitized and are available to the public. These recordings are housed at the newly renovated Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Library. We hope you'll take some time to listen through the work of over 50 years!

## **Updates on Winners**

Soyoung Cho (2015 JIC, 2nd prize) and Samuel Rosenthal (2018 JIC, 3<sup>rd</sup> prize) have been selected to be among 24 quarterfinal participants out of a field of 103 in the 2021 Primrose International Viola Competition. The competition will take place in December.

Zlatomir Fung, who won first prize in the 2015 JIC, made his Carnegie Hall debut on October 19 with pianist Mishka Rushdie Momen. The program included Schumann's Adagio and Allegro, Op. 70; Schubert's Sonata in A Minor, D. 821, "Arpeggione;" Dvorák's "Silent Woods," Op. 68, No. 5; and Franck's Violin Sonata (transcribed for cello by Delsart). This was one of numerous concerts in his full performing schedule this season (see https:// www.zlatomirfung.com/schedule).

*Maria Ioudenitch*, who won 2nd prize in the 2012 JIC, won first prize in the 2021 Tibor Varga International Violin Competition in Sion Switzerland; finals were held September 4, at which she performed the Brahms Violin Concerto. Awards included CHF 20,000 for first prize, as well as an additional CHF 500 each for the Audience Prize and Youth Jury Prize.

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Thinking about how much FMMC has meant to me over these past 50 years led me to my drawer stuffed with old FMMC performances at which I have sung...Wow....way over 30 or more performances in these years. I joined in 1970 with the encouragement of Jane White, who was my voice teacher at that time. She played such a big part in my reason to join the Club. She actually accompanied me for my audition at Barker Hall. When I first moved to this area from California, I was the soloist at St. Luke's Methodist Church in DC, and one of the early Club members, Kathryn Rawls, was a past FMMC President. She, too, encouraged me to audition.

My first FMMC performance at Barker Hall was for the 86th season on March 12, 1971, where I performed Samuel Barber's Hermit Songs with Sarah Klinkt. Then on Feb. 9, 1973, I performed again at Barker Hall in a performance of a work by Handel entitled "Susse Stille." I performed at Barker Hall with violin and cello – the 88th season.

In the 80's, I performed several times at the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church and also at Jordan Hall-Jordan Kitts Downtown. In the 90's and early 2000's, I sang at Sumner eight times with Gillian Cookson, pianist, and only once in 2015 at Calvary Baptist.

Since the year 2000, I sang nine times at the Old Town Hall in Fairfax. In the past, I also gave three performances at Strathmore Hall and I sang at the Church of the Epiphany in a performance of FMMC Composers!

So you can definitely see how much being a member of the Friday Club has meant to me! I have had a reason to study new repertoire every year, since FMMC provided me with a definite place to perform classical music. Gillian Cookson has been my pianist for almost every one of these
