Twenty-six contestants from six countries traveled to Washington DC to compete in the semifinals on May 27 & 28, in the music building at George Washington University, and six finalists were selected for the finals in The Terrace Theater of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts on Sunday, May 29. The competition judges, Annie Fullard (Violin), Daniel Foster (Viola), and Emilio Colon (Cello), selected the following winners:

The winning composition in the 2022 WIC Composition competition, *Terrarium*, for string quartet, by Sam Wu, was performed during the WIC Strings Finals by the Sunrise Quartet: Claudia Chudakoff & Teri Lazar, Violins, Osman Kivrak, Viola, Marion Baker, Cello. Sam is a graduate student at Rice University in Texas. The next WIC Composition competition, chaired by Mark Simon, will be held in 2025.

Mark your calendars! This November 11, 2022, in the Terrace Theater, we look forward to showcasing our WIC 2021 and 2022 winners, Vivian Chen, Piano, and Sydney Lee, Cello, in concerto performances with the Avanti Orchestra under the direction of Pablo Saelzer, Conductor.



The WIC Voice competition will be held on May 27-28, 2023. Applications will be open in October through the Getacceptd website with a February deadline for entry. With a distinguished panel of preliminary, semifinals, and finals judges, we anticipate an exciting event welcoming singers to DC to compete for top prizes. We hope our FMMC membership will support the competition through attendance at the semifinal and final rounds.

### Arioso Chorale: A Successful Trip – Now Back to Work

rom June 28 to July 5, a mix of over 60 singers from the Arioso Chorale and National Philharmonic Choruses (and about 20 non-singing guests) enjoyed the sights, food, and challenges of presenting two concerts at the Amalfi Festival in Maiori, Italy. The festival is celebrating its 25<sup>th</sup> year of operations and the chorus was the "opening act." The combined choruses presented the Italian premier of the Leavitt Requiem (sung in the Cathedral of a 10<sup>th</sup>-century Benedictine abbey located in Cava de' Tirreni) with Soloists Soprano Danielle Talamantes, Mezzo Madalaine Vander-Linden, Tenor Enrico Terrone Guerra, and Bass Kerry Wilkerson. The second concert, in honor of the US's July 4 celebration, presented a mixture of Broadway, Gospel, and other Americana music to a highly appreciative audience in Maiori.

The Chorale begins its 2022-23 season with their first concert in October. The principal work on the program will be Ernest Bloch's Avodath Hakodesh (Sacred Service). This 1933 composition draws its text, the Sabbath Saturday Morning Service, taken from the Union Prayer Book of the Jewish Reform Movement. The concerts will be given at the Church of the Reformation (212 E. Capitol St., NE) starting at 8:00 PM on October 13 and 15, 2022. Additional details will be posted on the FMMC website (finmc.org).

By the time this Newsletter is published, the Chorale and its orchestra will be in rehearsal for this concert. However, it is never too late to join in this project. Singers and instrumentalists interested in participating should contact Peter Baum at chorale@fnmc.org for further information and the schedule.

# Johansen International Competition Updates

### Updates on Winners

Samuel Rosenthal (2018 JIC, 3rd prize viola) won second prize in the 2021 Primrose International Viola Competition this past December.

Two past JIC participants were selected for the semifinals of the Queen Elisabeth Cello Competition, which took place in May 2022: *James Baik* (2018 JIC, Finalist) and *Taeguk Mun* (2012 JIC, Best Performance of Commissioned Work). The 24 semifinalists were chosen from a field of 66. Taeguk was also among the 12 cellists selected to compete in the finals.

Cellist Michał Balas (2018 JIC, 1st prize tied) won first prize in the 2022 Classic Strings Cello Competition, which took place in Dubai, UAE in May 2022. He also won a special prize for the best performance of a Maltese piece. He was awarded a  $\in$ 50,000 cash prize, along with a tour of ten concerts with an honorarium of  $\in$ 5,000 per concert.

Cellist *Krysztof Michalski* (2018 JIC, 1st prize tied) won third prize (tied) in the 2022 Kodály Competition, held in Debrecen, Hungary in June 2022.

Several 2022 JIC winners participated in the 2022 Stulberg Competition, which took place in May.Violinist *Jacques Forestier* (3rd prize in JIC) won the silver medal and the Bach Prize, receiving a total cash prize of \$6,000. The win also includes a performance with the Western Michigan University Symphony Orchestra.Violinist *Jinan Laurentia Woo* (1<sup>st</sup> prize in JIC), cellist *Romain-Olivier Gray* (2<sup>nd</sup> prize in JIC), and violist *Sidney Lee* (semifinalist in JIC) were among the 12 finalists in the competition; each will receive a \$1,000 stipend.

### **Upcoming Concerts**

Several performances featuring 2022 JIC winners will take place in the 2022-2023 season.

Violinist Jinan Laurentia Woo (1<sup>st</sup> prize) will perform the Tchaikovsky concerto with the Avanti Orchestra on September 23, 2022. The concert will take place at Church of the Epiphany, Washington, DC.

On October 30, 2022, there will be a concerto concert featuring three of the 2022 winners—*Jinan Laurentia Woo; Emad Zolfaghari* (2<sup>nd</sup> prize viola); and *Luka Coetzee* (1<sup>st</sup> prize cello)—with members of the National Philharmonic at Strathmore in Bethesda, MD.

Cellist *Romain-Olivier Gray* (2<sup>nd</sup> prize) will perform the Dvorak concerto with the Prince George's Philharmonic in November 2022.

A recital featuring all three first-prize winners (violinist Jinan Laurentia Woo, vio-

list *Seoyeon Ryu*, and cellist *Luka Coetzee*) with pianist Frank Conlon will take place on February 26, 2023, at Church of the Annunciation in Washington, DC.

In addition, we are in discussions with the Capital City Symphony and the Apollo Orchestra for possible concerto appearances in upcoming seasons.

# Amy Rothstein: Life Member

It's hard to believe it's been 50 years since I became a member of FMMC, but having joined in 1972, it's easy to do the math to know it has been that long.

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My interest in music has been lifelong. My father was a concert pianist who gave solo recitals, so I slept and awakened to his practicing. He collaborated with other musicians as well, so it was natural my love of all kinds of music literature developed as a result.

My father was my first piano teacher. I also had other teachers and decided early in childhood that I wanted to make music my career. I received my undergrad degree from Oberlin Conservatory of Music and M.M. degree from the Manhattan School of Music.

After graduating from Oberlin, my husband and I started our married life in Schenectady, N,Y. I became very involved there as an accompanist for choral groups and a Light Opera Company. I also started teaching piano.

In 1971, as a result of my husband's work, we moved to Arlington, Va. We had a baby daughter, and life was very pleasant; but even though I practiced the piano,I had no involvement with other musicians. My mother was concerned about this and recommended I contact Jacqueline Rosenblatt. She and her family had been long-time friends of my parents and grandparents. Jacqueline recommended I audition for FMMC; so I took her advice and prepared for my audition. She was one of the FMMC members who recommended me for the Solo Piano category. I'll be forever grateful to her because I doubt I would have collaborated with amazing FMMC musicians if it hadn't been for my membership in FMMC.
