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# From the President



# Johansen International Competition News

The next JIC event will be a Winners' Recital on the Roth Concert Series at Annunciation Catholic Church on Sunday, February 26, 2023, at 5:00 pm. The church is located at 3810 Massachusetts Avenue, NW, Washington, DC. Performers will be the three first-prize 2022 winners with Frank Conlon collaborating on piano. The program will include music by Brahms, Debussy, Saint-Saëns, Penderecki, Britten, Schumann, and Wieniawski as well as a performance of the work by Jessica Krash commissioned for the 2022 competition, *The Imagined Wisdom of Bella Pavis*. The concert will be video recorded, so look for it on YouTube in the future!

### Performer bios:

Jinan Laurentia Woo (first prize and Best Performance of



Commissioned Work) is 15 years old and the youngest winner in the JIC's history. She is currently a 10<sup>th</sup>-grader and studies with Li Lin and Stella Chen at the Pre-College division of the Juilliard School. Laurentia made her orchestral solo debut at age 12 with the Salzburg Chamber Soloists, and she has been

invited to perform with numerous orchestras in Asia, Europe, and North America. In 2021, Laurentia was accepted into the Perlman Music Summer Program as the youngest student. An avid chamber musician and humanitarian, Laurentia founded the Trio Camelia in Hong Kong, giving concerts and raising money to support the "Build A Music School" Foundation, providing opportunities for young children in Myanmar to learn instruments. In 2019, she won first prize at the Zhuhai International Mozart Competition for Young Musicians and in 2022 won the Vancouver Symphony Young Artists Competition.

Violist Seoyeon Ryu (first prize) is 19 years old and received



her admission to the College of Music, Seoul National University in December, 2022. Seoyeon made her first recital debut at age 16 in the 2019 Kumho Prodigy Recital. In 2022, she was invited to participate in Morningside Music Bridge as part of her JIC prize. Since then, she has won first prize in the Birmingham

International Competition in United Kingdom, the International Music Competition in France, and the Clara Schumann International Competition, and she won second prize in the Caneres International Competition in Austria in 2022.



Acclaimed by *Fanfare* magazine as "tonally, technically, and musically superb," 17-year-old Canadian cellist **Luka Coetzee** (first prize) made her solo debut at age 11 with the Calgary Civic Symphony. She has won prizes in several national and international competitions, including the 6th UNISA International

Strings Competition, the 2022 Dotzauer International Cello Competition, the 2019 Orchestre Symphonique de Montréal Manulife Competition, the Canadian Music Competition, and the 2021 Shean Strings Competition. In November 2022, she will be competing as a finalist in the Pablo Casals International Award in El Vendrell, Spain. This past September, Luka participated in the Kronberg Academy Cello Masterclasses where she received the Frans Helmerson Promotional Award. She also performed with the Stuttgart Chamber Orchestra in the new Casals Forum concert hall at the Kronberg Academy. As a member of the Echo Klassik nominated LGT Young Soloists, Luka has performed in numerous concert halls around the world including Elbphilharmonie Hamburg, Berlin Philharmonie, the Tonhalle in Zürich, and the Victoria Hall in Singapore. She also recorded and premiered a new arrangement of the Beethoven A major Cello Sonata for cello and strings on NAXOS at the Teldex Studio in Berlin. The CD was released in November 2020 and Luka was praised by Fanfare magazine as "sublime, with an interpretative grasp . . . playing of rare quality." At the age of one Luka had her first cello lesson with Christine Bootland. She also started playing piano at the age of three and finished the Royal Conservatory of Music ARCT piano exam with First Class Honours under the instruction of Derek Chiu. Her previous mentors include John Kadz, Johanne Perron, and Horacio Contreras. She is currently pursuing her bachelor's degree in cello performance at the Hochschule für Musik Franz Liszt with Wolfgang Emanuel Schmidt in Weimar, Germany.

## **Updates on Winners**

Cellist *Luka Coetzee*, 2022 JIC first-prize winner, has won the first-prize 2022 Pablo Casals International Award. A video of her performance is on the competition website (https://www.paucasals.org/en/video/luka-coetzee-pablo-casals-international-award-for-young-cellists-2022-winner/). Her prize includes €18,000, the opportunity to take part in concerts organized by the Pablo Casals Foundation, and advice on how to develop her professional and artistic career.

2022 JIC second-prize cello winner *Romain-Olivier Gray* performed Dvořák's cello concerto with the Prince George's Philharmonic on November 19, 2022. The orchestra has featured a JIC winner every year since 2020.

Violinist *Maria Ioudenitch* (2012 JIC, 2nd prize) has signed with Austrian agency Raab & Böhm for general management. She is already an Opus 3 artist for engagements in the Americas.

Violinist Julian Rhee (2018, 1st prize) performed on a tribute concert for Henryk Szeryng that took place on December 2, 2022 at PianoForte in Chicago and was streamed on December 18 (video can be seen here: https://nscmf.org/concert/a-tribute-to-legendary-violinist-henryk-szeryng/?livestream). Julian was featured on the concert as the winner of the Arkady Fomin Scholarship (more information about the scholarship can be found here: https://nscmf.org/afsf/; a bio of Julian can be found here: https://nscmf.org/artists/julian-rhee/).

We are expecting that Nadir will conduct a masterclass for our high school students on Saturday, February 4, so stay tuned and check the FMMC website for updates.

The brilliant winners of the 2022 Johansen International Competition will return to the area to perform in the Roth Concert Series at Annunciation Catholic Church in Washington, DC, on Sunday, February 26<sup>th</sup> at 5:00 pm. Pianist Frank Conlon will be collaborating with these young artists, and the program will feature Debussy, Saint-Saëns, Brahms, as well as



the work that was commissioned for the competition, *The Imagined Wisdom of Bella Pavis*, composed by Jessica Krash.

As we continue our musical journey through 2023, I wish for you joy, good health, and great success, and look forward to seeing you at one of our upcoming concerts.

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## Book Review

## Suzuki: The Man and His Dream to Teach the Children of the World

by Eri Hotta

Adam Gopnik, writing in the November 14 *New Yorker* magazine, calls this book essential reading and one of the best books of 2022. Here is the excerpt from Amazon:

Eri Hotta's biography of the innovative Japanese educator Shinichi Suzuki is both informative and entertaining. The so-called Suzuki Method he developed has enabled hundreds of thousands of children worldwide to learn to play musical instruments, most notably the violin. Based on the conventional foundations of progressive, cumulative learning, Suzuki also felt that "fun" needed to be a part of the process if it was to be successful. Hotta rightly calls him a "revolutionary" who wanted to prove that "talent" was not exclusive to a chosen few, but rather something that all children could develop. His method, he believed, was applicable to all fields of learning, not just music. Born in 1898, Suzuki's life and career spanned 100 turbulent and eventful years that witnessed monumental changes for Japan, changes that deeply affected both his life and career. Hotta successfully helps to explain the enigma of Suzuki the man and the reasons for the success of his Method and its universal popularity.
