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A Well-Tuned Team

n early 2022, Nan Cooper stepped down from her position as FMMC's Orchestra Manager to attend to family matters in Florida. Nan had held that key position since 2008, the same year she joined the club. To build on Nan's long tenure in this important position, Angelina Wong volunteered to assume that post just after Nan's departure (see page 3).

From an audience's perspective, symphony orchestras can appear as welloiled machines, with musicians working together to create beautiful music under the direction of a conductor.

In reality, making that seemingly flawless performance happen requires months of work, not only from the players, but also from the orchestra's conductor and manager.

For FMMC's Avanti Orchestra, the key players in this scenario are Music Director and Conductor Pablo Saelzer, who will step down from his post at the end of this season, and the Orchestra Manager, formerly Nan and now Angelina.

The 14-year partnership between Pablo and Nan actually started by coincidence. In 2004, Pablo moved to the Wash-

ington, DC, area and eventually joined the faculty of the Levine School of Music. Nan always loved music, so, in her 40s, she decided to learn the violin as a hobby and began taking lessons at the Levine School. "Since Pablo was new, he was given the new adult students," says Nan, "including me." She also held a management position with USA Swimming.

It was during these lessons that they began talking about the management side of the orchestra when Pablo was selected as Avanti's conductor beginning with the 2005-2006 season. When the current orchestra manager, Adrienne Paiewonsky, stepped away, Pablo asked Nan to take over.

Throughout her years of service, Nan assumed myriad tasks behind the scenes. The responsibilities of the orchestra manager range from recruiting orchestra personnel, interacting with venue staff, negotiating contracts, and shepherding soloists.

In collaboration with Pablo, Nan scheduled concert dates, prepared the program and cover art, and oversaw the stage design and set-up. She also repro-

duced and distributed practice parts to the orchestra, including bowings by Pablo. While players brought their own stands and lights to rehearsals and concerts, ever resourceful Nan took on the tasks of setting up the seats for rehearsals and even providing delicious homemade snacks to the group during rehearsal breaks.

"A major responsibility is acting as a liaison between the conductor and the players, says Angelina. "While many people have Pablo's contact information, the Orchestra Manager is the point of contact." Pablo had found that managing the orchestra personnel was a "headache," and Nan took on more and more of that responsibility. "It was a collaboration," according to Pablo. "If there were artistic details, check with Pablo; if there were administrative issues, see Nan."

"Pablo was very organized," adds Nan, "but he needed to concentrate on the artistic vision for the orchestra, and you

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Arioso Chorale: Introducing a New Singing Group

ith the completion of the season's first concert, the Chorale is moving back into the 19th century and preparing a work by Giacomo Puccini. While Puccini is most remembered for his many operas, his first major non-operatic work was the *Messa a 4 con orchestra (Messa Di Gloria)*. First performed in 1880, it sat effectively unknown and unplayed until 1952. Even today, it is a rarely performed work from a truly

gifted composer. In addition to this main work, Paul has programmed Vaughan Williams's *Serenade to Music*.

Two soloists will be on stage for the Puccini. Tenor Alan Palacios Chan and bass Robert McDonald have agreed to participate and will also sing other numbers including the "Sanctus" from Gounod's Messe Solennelle and "Votre Toast" (the Toreador Song) from Bizet's Carmen.

This concert will also mark the first performance of the Arioso Chamber Singers. This small group is made up of 16 singers from within the main Chorale and will specialize in a cappella music. Their initial offering will be Poulenc's *Un* soir de neige (Night of Snow).

The concert dates are Thursday, January 26 and Saturday, January 28, 2023 starting at 8:00 PM in the sanctuary of the Church of the Reformation located at 212 E. Capitol St, NE. •

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can't do both." She has a lot of respect for Pablo and his efforts to let instrumentalists know that he was looking for players that would not just "drop in" and to set expectations for musicianship. "You could hear the difference," Nan says.

"I never would have lasted for 18 years if the partnership between me and Nan was not solid," says Pablo. "If she had not helped me, I would have quit long ago. Our skills are complementary."

Achieving the orchestra's goals, however, is a team effort, according to Pablo, Nan, and Angelina. Two important parts of the Avanti team have been FMMC board members Anne Zim and Joanna Taylor.

As FMMC's treasurer, Anne worked with Nan to fine-tune budget matters and contractual agreements. Anne would make suggestions, but Nan was very conscientious about making sure Avanti's operations were within budget. "I've always been a big supporter of the orchestra," says Anne, "and Pablo and Nan brought Avanti to a different level."While Nan handled logistics with the venues, she also graciously resolved issues with orchestra members as well as with the FMMC board."I have worked with three other wonderful Orchestra Managers over time," says Anne, "but none could hold a candle to Nan."

Joanna Taylor currently serves as FMMC's Outreach Director and Administrative Coordinator. She is also a cellist and performs with Avanti. Joanna assisted Nan from the start by proofing programs before Nan sent them to the printer, reviewing mails and notes to players before they were sent, substituting for Nan when she was away, and helping with whatever needed to be done. Most importantly, says Joanna, she provided "moral support" when Nan needed it.

The overall result is that the current members of the Avanti Orchestra are loyal supporters of the total package. Pablo has been able to concentrate on the orchestra's artistic mission while Nan, and now Angelina, ably shoulder myriad details.

That cooperation is what keeps Avanti and its audiences humming. •

A Special Opportunity

Angelina Wong stepped into the Orchestra Manager's role with Avanti shortly after Nan Cooper resigned. She already was an archivist with FMMC, but the manager's role was a new position for her. Nonetheless, she had been involved with many aspects of music for years.

Angelina's music career began in high school as a piano student. Why? "Piano was the only instrument I could learn without being required to purchase the instrument," she says. Realizing her musical potential, her teacher recommended she join the Montgomery College (MC) Chorus, which eventually led to a music major in vocal performance.

In 2016, Avanti Conductor Pablo Saelzer asked some MC singers to support Arioso Chorale for *Die Fledermaus*. Subsequently, Angelina received a follow-up email from Chorale Chair Peter Baum, which included the chorale's schedule. She wasn't singing with any groups at the time, nor taking voice lessons privately, so she joined Arioso and became an FMMC member in 2019. Currently she sings with the National Philharmonic Chorale and has resumed private lessons to hone her talent as a soloist.

When Angelina volunteered to take on the Orchestra Manager's position, she was completing a Master's in Library and Information Science as a gateway to becoming a better music archivist for FMMC. Angelina has applied her archival skills in many ways that benefit FMMC, including adding hidden Composers Group recordings and programs to the Martin Luther King, Jr. Library's DigDC digital portal. "I've developed administrative musical experience through the archives that I can apply to Avanti," she says.

"I honestly hadn't expected my responsibilities to be so numerous when I volunteered for the position, Nan and Pablo have been vital in guiding me since they know the players and overall operations so well."

In addition to the many roles defined by the past and current Avanti team, the Orchestra Manager also doubles as the Avanti's Music Librarian, which uses skills Angelina already has perfected. One of her tasks was to organize the orchestral scores in the FMMC Archives. "I'm responsible for checking out music from the FMMC Archives, making purchases when scores or parts are not in the library, delivering the music to the conductor, distributing parts to the players, collecting and organizing those parts at the end of concerts, and returning the music to the library."

Still, Angelina realizes that the primary point of her position is to be a liaison. She is not just the contact point between players and the conductor, but between anyone trying to reach the orchestra, including venue staff, musicians, and audience members. "I basically answer anything that is related to the orchestra but not necessarily related to music," she comments.

"Angelina is a fast learner and a hard worker," says Pablo. "She has helped with every task related to processing the com-

positions and organizing concerts."

Angelina views creating the concert program as another key part of her position. These documents are retained in the FMMC Archives and represent Avanti to the audience. It's important to her that the programs reflect exactly what the audience sees and hears on stage and provide up-to-date information on all aspects of FMMC.

As Orchestra Manager, "I've learned so much more than the average singer would know, such as how to set up an orchestra stage and tune sections to create a balance of sound. I am in an extremely beneficial position where I can make acquaintances with very supportive instrumentalists."

Her most memorable moment so far? "Whenever I can sit behind the orchestra and watch Pablo conduct, that's special." •

Dear Club Members, as announced in the last Newsletter, this is my last season as Music Director and Conductor of Avanti. I thought it would be good to share with you part of the letter I wrote to the players in Avanti, the Orchestra of the FMMC, and extend my gratitude to all of you.

Dear Avanti,

After considering it for some time, I have decided this will be my last season as music director/conductor of Avanti. This is, for me, the end of an exciting and beautiful journey with you.

The down time imposed by the pandemic, as for many, had for me a silver lining. I had the time to stop and think about how I feel about being an orchestra conductor. It became clear to me that my main interest regarding conducting is the pieces themselves which make up the symphonic repertoire. Not all of them, but the ones I personally find fascinating, moving, and relevant. Conducting Avanti, amongst other things, has afforded me the opportunity to dig deep into these works under the exciting pressure of an upcoming concert. I have enjoyed every minute of studying, preparing, and rehearsing. On the other hand, I have come to understand that being an orchestra conductor is not a role I wear comfortably.

At the same time, this down time gave me an opportunity to re-evaluate my interests and priorities. At some point during this process it became clear to me that there are a couple of avenues I want to explore and others I want to revisit, all which will of course, make demands on my time. I strongly believe that a dedicated group like Avanti deserves a conductor willing and able to put forth their best. It became clear to me that I am not at that place anymore. So, it is time for me to step down and let the group find a new, inspired conductor.

It has been one of the great honors of my life to have had the opportunity to be entrusted to lead and to develop this ensemble. I love the players in Avanti and have tremendous respect for your commitment. I am happy and satisfied with the work I have done with Avanti since 2005. I sincerely believe that the orchestra is in a very good place. It continues to attract new talent and has a good reputation amongst musicians in the area.

I am the conductor I am today thanks to the many hours in which you put your talents in my hands.

I would like to add that I am not stepping down to take the same position with another orchestra. I sincerely want to pause and contemplate my future.

I thank you for your loyalty, support, and enthusiasm.
