Honorary Members To Be Announced at Annual Meeting

A t the February meeting of the Board of Governors, the FMMC Honorary Membership Committee presented nominations for three individuals to receive Honorary Membership. Their names, along with letters of support, were unanimously approved by the Board and will be formally presented to the membership at the May 5th Annual Meeting and Luncheon.

The first is Lois Smith Jones, longtime active member of FMMC, a pianist, and one who has performed extraordinary service to the Club and the FMMC Foundation over many years. Serving as a member and Chair of several committees, she was President of FMMC from 2001-2005. A valued trustee of the Foundation, she has assisted Directors in past years and continues to lend important efforts to the Washington International Competition. Currently, she oversees the Club's recital series at the Chevy Chase Woman's Club. For music in the community, she has been President of the Montgomery Chapter of Maryland State Music Teachers Association, and as a highly respected teacher of piano, she frequently adjudicates festivals and competitions. One sponsor praised Lois for "...admirable qualities of leadership, commitment, generosity, and collegiality...she embodies the qualities that best reflect the mission and goals of our organization and its leadership."

The second musician to be honored is Carla Heubner. A native of Chile, and a student of the great Claudio Arrau, she is considered one of Washington's finest musicians with an important performing career. She is also known as founding and artistic director of the "IN SERIES" at Mount Vernon College beginning in 1982. Since 2008, the series became the resident company at Source Theater. ments over the past year. The meeting will be from 10 AM to 12 PM in a downstairs meeting room at DACOR Bacon House and is open to all interested members.



This year the first-place award will be named in honor of Louise Urban McClelland,



a devoted long time FMMC member for whom the WIC for Voice has a particular significance, and who has participated in helping run the voice competition several times over the years. Louise has not been in robust health recently and is currently living in a senior community in Fairfax Virginia. She is honored to be acknowledged in this loving fashion. his year's first prize in the Wash-I ington International Competition (WIC) will be named in honor of Louise McClelland Urban. A longtime member of the Friday Morning Music Club, Louise has been devoted to the work of the FMMC Foundation and the Washington International Competition for Voice in particular. She served as a member of the Foundation Board, preliminary round adjudicator, consultant on suitable judging panel members, as well as being a host to, and mentor for, competitors. The funds for the award have been donated by her devoted students and colleagues, as an indication of their great affection and esteem.

Louise McClelland Urban has had a vocal career that encompassed performing, teaching, and literary scholarship. After her Fulbright vocal studies in Vienna, she joined the Voice Faculty at the University of Maryland, College Park, in 1965 and performed in solo recitals and orchestral, oratorio and operatic appearances in the Greater Washington area. She was heard at the National Gallery of Art, Westminster Art Song Festival, and the Kennedy Center.

She and her late husband, Gerhard Urban, were among the first board members of the Vocal Arts DC. Known as a specialist in the songs of Hugo Wolf, Louise is the translator of the Austrian composter Hugo Wolf's "Letters to Melanie Kochert" and was also a book reviewer for the American Music Teachers Journal and a manuscript reader for the Oxford University Press and Simon & Schuster. Her Wolf lecture recital took her to many universities and Song Festivals throughout the US: She was awarded the Hugo Wolf Medallion by the Austrian government for her work performing and promoting his music in the US.

Louise Urban left her mark as a highly successful voice teacher here in DC, and her students won many major performance competitions, including the NSO Young Soloists Competition, the Paul Robeson Competition and the Naumberg International Competition. Her students were also Metropolitan Opera Regional Finalists in 1984, 1986, and 1993. Many of her students have gone on to perform professionally, and many have also gone on to become teachers in higher education.

Now fully retired, she was always an ardent supporter of the Friday Morning Music Club, and she was a preliminary judge for many years for the FMMC vocal competitions.

promising young performers, many of whom progressed to important careers. The operas were successfully produced with modest budgets and small theater space and made available for affordable ticket prices to the public. The Westchester Residence is now the beneficiary of her musical expertise as she brings them free innovative programs ranging from chamber music and operatic evenings to events featuring Black-American choral traditions and Latin-American composers, often including lectures. From one sponsor, "Her amazing artistic ability and creativity and her sponsoring of artists has made an enormous difference in the Washington musical scene..."

The third candidate, Maestro Joel Lazar, is a longstanding member of FMMC and one of Washington's most celebrated musicians, acclaimed by the Washington Post as "... one of Washington's premier conductors of both new and old music..." He was music director of the JCC Symphony Orchestra for 20 years, and is currently director of the Symphony of the Potomac and the Washington Sinfonietta. His remarkable conducting career has included the Theater Chamber Players, the Alexandria Opera Americana, the IN SERIES, and from 1997-2001, cover conductor for the National Symphony Orchestra. There have been appearances and appointments with countless orchestras within the US and Europe.

A graduate of Harvard University, he studied with Pierre Boulez, Walter Piston, and Randall Thompson. He has lectured and conducted at Harvard University, New York University, and the University of Virginia. An honorary member of the Bruckner Society of America, he worked with legendary master interpreter of Mahler and Bruckner, Jascha Horenstein, assisted with recordings and important articles and program notes about those composers.

From one sponsor (and member of the orchestra), "...there is always great respect and admiration for his conducting and rehearsal technique as well as his wonderful ability to encourage ...in the most positive and professional way...." And from another letter, "...while he has achieved deserved recognition, I believe he is still something of an unsung hero."

he winners' concert of the 2022 JIC took place on February 26, 2023 at Annunciation Catholic Church in Washington, DC. The performers were the three first-prize winners, Jinan Laurentia Woo, Seoyeon Ryu, and Luka Coetzee, with FMMC member and church music director Frank Conlon collaborating on piano. Many thanks to Frank for organizing the concert, including a nice reception, as well as for facilitating a generous donation from the church toward JIC expenses. The program included Sonata in F minor, op. 120, No. 1 for viola and piano by Johannes Brahms; the first movement (Preludio) from Suite for Solo Cello by Kristof Penderecki; movements 1 and 2 (Allegro and Scherzo - pizzicato) from Cello Sonata in C Major, op. 65, by Benjamin Britten; Adagio and Allegro, op. 70, by Robert Schumann; Scherzo-Tarantelle, op. 16, by Henryk Wieniawski; Sonata for Violin and Piano in G minor, L. 140, by Claude Debussy; and Caprice d'après l'étude en forme de valse de Saint-Saëns by Eugene-Auguste Ysaÿe. Of note also was the world premiere of DC-area composer Jessica Krash's work commissioned for the 2022 JIC, The Imagined Wisdom of Bella Pavis, performed by Jinan Laurentia Woo, who won the prize for the best performance of this piece during the competition.



FMMC Stands Out at the History Network

Again this year FMMC was the only musical organization invited to participate in the History Network on Friday afternoon, March 24th. This signature event included displays from 57 local groups and was held in the spacious Main Hall of Martin Luther King Memorial Library.

President Leslie Luxemburg and Archivist Mary Alice Davidson staffed a table with handouts highlighting FMMC's many programs. The colorful display included FMMC's 2022-2023 Concert Series, posters from the recent Avanti and Arioso concerts, and the April 4th Master Class with Ann Schein.

The poster borrowed from FMMC's Program Director Yooni Lee that announces the monthly Friday Chamber concerts at 10th and G was a showstopper, since it promoted a "FREE Chamber Concert Today." The highly visible announcement gave Leslie and Mary Alice an opportunity to share programs from past chamber concerts and underscore the two remaining concert dates this season on April 21st and May 19th.

Participants were also intrigued by the FMMC name and history and were surprised to learn that all concerts are free. Many were musicians who had played or sung previously but were unaware of the various ways local musicians at all levels can participate in FMMC's many performance options. Samples of FMMC's newsletter were also on hand to give attendees further insights through profiles of student members and outreach opportunities.

FMMC is well-known within the local history community because of its past interactions with two of the organizers. The DC History Center archives houses extensive documents chronicling decades of FMMC and FMMC Foundation history.

The quality of applicants is extremely high-level, and we expect high level performances from these brilliant artists.

The semifinals will take place in the Phillips Hall (Basement level) of



the Music Building, George Washington University, 801 22nd Street NW, Washington, DC, on Saturday May 27th at 9:00 am. The finals will be in the Terrace Theater of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts on Sunday, May 28 at 2:00 pm. This year's First Prize will be named in honor of Louise McClelland Urban, longtime Foundation board member who also worked tirelessly in support of the WIC Voice competitions. All events are free and open to the public. The audience gets to vote on their favorite performer in the finals on Sunday, so plan to attend, bring a friend, and come to support of these talented performers.

At the conclusion of another year of service, I would like to take the opportunity to thank our incredible Foundation Board of Trustees for their faithful guidance, wisdom, and support. We have accomplished much and are poised to achieve even greater successes in the coming year. It has been my privilege to serve as Director. DigDC, a digital part of MLK's archives, includes recordings and programs from FMMC's Composer Concerts in the 1960s through the 1980s and will soon include photos and documents discovered in MLK's cache of FMMC scrapbooks.

The History Network is a signature part of the free three-day DC History Conference, which was launched in 1971. The interdisciplinary community conference considers the past, present, and future of the DMV. According to Karen Harris, senior manager with the History Center, registration for this year's conference doubled to more than 800 registrants from the DC area. The 57 booths participating in the History Network featured such organizations as the Black Broad Branch Project, The DC Preservation League, and Trust for the National Mall **•**
