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Student Profile: Evelyn Song

The following is an edited version of Christine Kharazian's interview of former student member Evelyn Song:

1. Do you remember your first encounter with the violin? When and how you chose to become a violinist?

I was introduced to the violin shortly before I turned six years old. The music teacher at my school brought in a few instruments at the beginning of the year, played each one for the class, and let us decide which instrument we wanted to learn. When my mom came to pick me up later that day, I said to her, "I want to play the violin because it's pretty!" I was already learning piano at the time and was excited to add violin lessons to my musical activities. By middle school, I knew that I wanted to study music in college. During high school I was given a lot of violin performance opportunities, and the more time I spent with the violin, the more I fell in love with its voice. It was then that I decided, without a doubt, that I wanted to be a violinist.

2. You love connecting stories with violin performances. Can you tell us more about that?

When I was attending the New England Conservatory of Music, I was heavily involved in the school's Community Performances and Partnerships Program, through which we reached a large population in the surrounding communities. My areas of focus were musical storytelling in schools and performing themed recitals at senior homes. I loved the idea of getting young students excited about music at an early age by interweaving music with the reading of children's books. I saw that the residents of senior homes were very engaged when I shared an interesting fact about a piece before playing it or when I suggested something that they could listen

for while I played. The young students joyfully sang along, and their eyes brightened when they realized that the sounds from my violin were part of the story. The residents at senior homes laughed, cried, reflected on old memories, and listened with smiling faces and sometimes closed eyes as if they had traveled to a different time and place. After a musical storytelling event, a kindergartener asked if she could climb into my violin case and travel with me. At another school, I had the pleasure of discussing my work with a group of students after a reading of children's books accompanied by my music. When I was playing bedside concerts at a hospital, one patient, who had been unable to speak because of excruciating pain, was so delighted by what she heard that she carried on long conversations with me. She later told me that, while listening to me play the violin, she had forgotten that she was hurting. These very special personal connections are at the heart of my community engagement work, and the transformations that I witness inspire me to continue this work.

3. When thinking about your teachers what are things you are especially grateful for?

I have been blessed with many wonderful teachers. I am extremely grateful for their unwavering dedication to helping me reach my fullest potential. They constantly challenged me to explore new facets of music-making, to bring my playing to another level, and to never stop experimenting and learning. They did all of that with care, patience, generosity, and enthusiasm. Not only did I learn musically from them, but I also learned much from observing their humility, integrity, and impeccable work ethics. I am thankful to have been taught by such outstanding educators.

The chamber music program under the diligent direction of Yooni Lee, and the Arioso Chorale, led by Paul Leavitt, promise especially strong seasons as well. Though it took longer than anticipated, our FMMC piano has finally found a new home at the Woman's Club of Chevy Chase. Our December concert and holiday gathering will be taking place there on December 15, as will our annual meeting and luncheon on May 3, 2024.





4. What is your advice for young FMMC student members?

Seeing this repeatedly can provide one of the greatest motivations for us to continue pursuing excellence in music and sharing our art with the communities around us. The world is eager to hear your music!

5. What are your plans for the future?

I have moved back to Maryland and am very excited about all the possibilities that the D.C. area has to offer. I envision community engagement work to be a significant part of my career, with a special emphasis on musical storytelling in

schools and performing at senior living facilities, and hope to form meaningful local partnerships. For community engagement work at schools, it would be wonderful to establish a musical storytelling hour where students can enjoy music with good stories and learn about the violin. For senior living facilities, I would regularly provide exciting music programs for the residents, bringing the concert hall experience directly to them. Maybe one day I can take my community engagement work to different parts of the country! I also have a deep love for chamber music and have been toying with the idea of starting a chamber music concert series in the future. In addition, I really enjoy working with young students. My immediate plan is to build a small private studio with the goal of helping my students develop smart practice habits and a lifelong appreciation of music. **D**

As we bid a fond farewell to former Avanti Music Director Pablo Saelzer, we give a welcome invitation to our four conductor candidates: Shun Yao, Dietrich Paredes Baralt, Jamie Reeves, and Chi-Yuan Lin. Thank you to the Conductor Search Committee, which was made up largely of Avanti Orchestra volunteers.

Avanti's 2023-2024 concert season will have a unique setup with all concerts occurring at the Montgomery College Cultural Arts Center in Silver Spring at 7:30 p.m. Please consider bringing a food donation for the college's Fuel for Success Food Campaign! Avanti will still perform four public concerts, but each will feature a different conductor and soloist from a past Washington International Competition or Johansen International Competition. Audience feedback will be a major consideration when the Conductor Search Committee determines who will be Avanti's new Music Director.

Our first concert will be on September 30 with Conductor Shun Yao and soprano Adia Evans. The program has a 20th century piece by Unsuk Chin, a recital-style interlude with Adia Evans, and Mahler's *Symphony No. 4*.

Our second concert on November 18 will welcome Conductor Dietrich Paredes Baralt and violinist Youjin Lee. Together, they will perform a Mozart overture, Mendelssohn's *Violin Concerto in E minor*, and Beethoven's *Symphony No.* 7.

On March 9, our third concert will feature Conductor Jamie Reeves and pianist Yi-Yang Chen. This program includes a short piece by contemporary composer George Walker, Beethoven's *Piano Concerto No. 3*, and Brahms' *Symphony No. 3*.

Our final concert on May 4 with Conductor Chi-Yuan Lin and cellist Brannon Cho has a pending program. Stay tuned to find out what it will be!

This is an exciting time, and we look forward to hearing these highly qualified candidates as they lead and collaborate with our orchestra. Please join us—and participate in the selection process.

eflecting on the tremendous success of the 2023 WIC Voice Competition, I would like to take the opportunity here to once again thank our incredible Competition Chair, Chen-Li Tzeng, whose diligent and expert organizational and management skills made this competition run smoothly and efficiently. Our distinguished panel of jurors - James Morris, Sylvia McNair and Antony Walker - were impressed by the high quality of performances from the 16 semifinalists, who were chosen by five preliminary judges: Robert Baker, Jerome Barry, Thomas Reilly, Nancy McArthur Smith, and Deborah Thurlow. We are most grateful to our friends at George Washington University School of Music for providing their facilities for our use in the semifinal round of the competition.

The outstanding performances of the six finalists in the Terrace Theater on May 28 were enthusiastically received by an engaged audience. Matthew Hill, tenor, won the First Prize, named in honor of longtime FMMC member Louise Mc-Clelland Urban, as well as the Audience Prize. Magdalena Kužma, soprano, won Second Prize, and the Third Prize was tied between Adia Evans, soprano, and Nathaniel Sullivan, baritone. Erik Grendahl, baritone, and Helena Colindres, soprano, won Finalist Awards. The soloists were supported by the excellent collaboration and artistry of pianists Joy Schreier and Hui-Chuan Chen.

I am honored to serve another year as Director of the FMMC Foundation, working with wonderful colleagues on the board of Trustees as we plan for this year's WIC Piano Competition, led by this year's Competition Chair, Simon Finlow, and Yuri Chayama, Assistant Competition Chair. Applications will open on September 15th, and we anticipate another successful competition.

Please note that the next JIC competition will take place in 2025.

It's always a thrill to follow the developing careers of the talented artist-winners of the Washington International Competition (WIC) and Johansen International Competition for Young String Players (JIC), sponsored by the Foundation. We are delighted that Julian Rhee, first-prize violin winner of the 2018 JIC, will be returning to the DC area this Fall to perform the Tchaikovsky Concerto with the Washington Chamber Orchestra, under the baton of Jun Kim. FMMC members might recall that Maestro Kim and his orchestra accompanied our finalists in the 2019 WIC Voice Competition. Julian continues to garner accolades and high critical acclaim as his career blossoms. The Strad magazine praised his "Sophisticated, assured tone, superb intonation, and the kind of poise and showmanship that thrills audiences." He was awarded the Silver Medal in the 2022 Indianapolis Violin Competition and Second Prize in the Elmar Oliveira International Violin Competition, amongst many other awards. As soloist and chamber musician he has performed with major orchestras throughout the US and abroad and in notable



chamber music festivals and venues. Julian is presently a member of the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center's Bowers Program. We are proud to recognize his extraordinary talent and achievement as a past winner of the JIC and will continue to be counted amongst his most ardent supporters.
