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FMMC Piano Master Class Announced for October

E minent pianist Robert McDonald will present a master class on Tuesday, October 10th at the University of Maryland International Piano Archives in the Clarice Center for the Performing Arts. The session will take place from 10:00 AM until noon. Three pianists will perform.

American pianist Robert McDonald has performed throughout the United States, Europe, Latin America, and Asia as solo recitalist and, for many years, as recital partner to Isaac Stern and other distinguished instrumentalists. He has appeared with the San Francisco, Baltimore, and Curtis Symphony Orchestras as well as with the Orquesta Sinfonica Nacional in Costa Rica and the Orchestra Sinfonica Haydn di Bolzano e Trento in Italy. As a chamber musician, he has performed with the Juilliard, American, Takács, Muir, Brentano, St. Lawrence, Vermeer, Borromeo, Shanghai, and Orion string quartets, and has given concerts for the Lincoln Center Chamber Music Society, the Chicago Chamber Musicians, and NHK and BBC television worldwide. His discography includes recordings for Sony Classical, Vox, Bridge, Musical Heritage Society, ASV, and CRI.

McDonald is a member of the piano faculties at The Juilliard School and at the Curtis Institute of Music, where he holds the Penelope P.Watkins Chair in piano studies. In addition to being the artistic director of the Taos School of Music and Chamber Music Festival in New Mexico, he has participated in the Bergen, Lucerne, and Salzburg festivals in Europe, the Four Seasons, Marlboro, and Brevard festivals in the United States, the Steans Institute at Ravinia, as well as at the Banff Center in Canada, and the Music Academy of the West.

McDonald is the winner of the Gold Medal at the Busoni International Competition and has received the Deutsche Schallplatten Critics Award. He was awarded an honorary doctorate from the Manhattan School of Music in 2018.

Winner of the 1978 Washington International Competition for Piano, he returned as one of our esteemed judges for the 2020/2021 WIC.


High School String Competition

The next JIC won't be held until March 18-20, 2025, but planning is well under way. Preliminary judges from 2022 (Jodi Gatwood, Eunju Kwak, Marta Howard, Samuel Swift, and Ken Whitley) have agreed to serve again, and the acclaimed pianists Akira Eguchi and Eri Kang will be our collaborative pianists during the semifinals and finals. We also have secured excellent judges for the semifinals and finals, to be announced closer to the date of the competition. We again will be holding the competition at the beautiful First Congregational United Church of Christ (also known as Live! At 10^{th} & G) in downtown Washington, DC.

We have had one addition to the JIC Steering Committee: long-time FMMC member Sue Kelly. We know Sue will provide valuable input on all matters relating to the competition.

Updates on Winners

Violinist *Phoenix Avalon* (2018 JIC, 3rd prize) is a member of the Isidore Quartet, which has been receiving a great deal of acclaim, including winning the 2022 Banff International String Quartet Competition and a 2023 Avery Fisher Career Grant. The quartet, which signed with David Rowe Artists last year, has a busy performing schedule in venues throughout North America and Europe.

Cellist *Brannon Cho* (2012 JIC, 1st prize) served on the faculty of the Meadowmount School of Music, the distinguished summer program for young string players founded by legendary violin teacher Ivan Galamian in Westport, NY, during its 79th season this past summer. Brannon also will be a soloist with the Avanti Orchestra this coming season on May 4, 2024, performing Haydn's Concerto No. 1.

Violinist *Maria Ioudenitch* (2012 JIC, 2nd prize) released a CD titled "Songbird" this past May as part of her prize for winning the 2021 Joseph Joachim International Violin Competition. A review on the website classical-music.com commented that "the Russian-born American finds a beautifully golden, vocal quality in her playing that harks back to an earlier age. It makes the recording glow with warmth."

Cellist *Christine J. Lee* (2006 JIC, 2nd prize) has joined the Boston Symphony Orchestra.

Cellist *Krzysztof Michalski* (2018 JIC, first prize tied) won second prize (5000€) in the Professional category of the International Klaipėda David Geringas Cello Competition. The competition took place May 8-13, 2023.

Violinist *Julian Rhee* (2018 JIC, 1st prize) will be performing the Tchaikovsky concerto with the Washington Chamber Orchestra on September 22 and 23, 2023, at Rockville, MD and in Fairfax,VA venues. Julian also will be performing the Mendelssohn concerto with the Indianapolis Chamber Orchestra on January 20, 2024.

This past June, violist *Emad Zolfaghari* (2022 JIC, 2nd prize) won the grand prize in the 2023 Klein Competition. The prize includes \$5,000 and performance contracts with the Peninsula and Santa Cruz Symphonies and the Gualala Arts Chamber Series, among others, valued at \$13,000.

he new season is now underway, and we look forward to another exciting year of activities. Since September 15, the 2024 Washington International Competition (WIC) for Piano has been open for applications on the getacceptd website, and, as in previous years, we anticipate a significant response from highly qualified contestants. WIC Competition Chair, Simon Finlow, and Assistant Competition Chair, Yuri Chayama, will be working assiduously to manage the inflow of questions and concerns from the expected large number of inquiries over the course of the next five months when the deadline for applications will close, on February 15, 2024.

Now in its 75th year since the WIC Competition was established in 1950, this is in fact the 70th competition sponsored by the FMMC Foundation, in a 3-year cyclical rotation among piano, strings & composition, and voice. Prize awards totaling \$22,000 are offered, and the first-prize winner is invited to perform a solo recital - the Nagle Recital - in the following year.

This year's stellar jury panel – Olga Kern, John O'Connor, and Santiago Rodriguez – will provide individual advice and feedback to all semifinalists, an important feature of our competitions. Mark your calendars for May 25 & 26, 2024, and plan to attend and support these promising young artists.

It is my honor to serve as Foundation Director along with my wonderful colleagues on the Board of Trustees. We look forward to working together to make this year's 2024 WIC for Piano successful and memorable. Join with us as we seek to fulfill our mission to provide significant

to fulfill our mission to provide significant opportunities to help launch the careers of these young artists as they step upward from the ranks of talented students to recognition as professionals. <u>Erratum</u> – There was an error in my newsletter column last month (September 2023). Arioso Chorale: Season 10 Begins with October Concert

n August 27, approximately 50 singers of the Arioso Chorale came together at the Church of the Reformation to begin their preparation of several different settings of the Latin Hymn Te Deum Laudamus. The text was set down sometime around 387 CE and has been a part of the Catholic, Lutheran, Anglican, and Methodist liturgy ever since. Over the centuries, at least 35 composers have set the text to music (in some cases, more than once) and the Chorale has chosen versions by Charpentier (ca. 1698), Haydn (1800), Bruckner (1883), and Verdi (1898) that represent the Baroque, Classical, and Romantic eras of music. In addition, the Chorale's Chamber Singers will present two short works by Giovanni da Palestrina



and Antonio Lotti that are first-rate examples of polyphony as sung in the 1500s and 1600s.

Orchestra rehearsals started on September 18 and the need for violins and violas is great. If you are interested in joining, please let me know at chorale@ finmc.org.

The Chorale and orchestra will present this concert on the evenings of October 26 and October 28 beginning at 8:00 PM in the Sanctuary of the Church of the Reformation (212 E. Capitol St., NE). The Chorale will be joined on stage by a stellar quartet of soloists with soprano Alyssa Cox, mezzo-soprano Javon Charles, tenor Derrick Miller, and baritone Daryl Yoder.
