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Arioso: Chorale to Close Season with Trip to New York City

rioso Chorale and Orchestra presented its final Washington concert on April 11 and 13 with a program dedicated to French composers of the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Works by Francis Poulenc, Gabriel Fauré, Maurice Ravel, and Lili Boulanger made for an interesting and varied program. Soloists Gabrielle Levy, Diane Atherton, Leslie Luxemburg, Allan Palacios Chan, and Ross Tamaccio were featured in many of the numbers on the program. The concerts were livestreamed on the Church of the Reformation website and

the recording is available on their YouTube channel.

While Arioso's local season is complete, there remains one more concert to prepare. Arioso has been invited to sing on the Litha Symphony Orchestra's Gala Concert (and silent auction) that will take place in New York City at the end of June. More than 40 singers will make the trip and sing at the Church of the Holy Apostles on June 29. The program will include works by Samual Barber, Paul Leavitt, George Bizet, and Carl Orff.

After the summer break, Arioso will reconvene at the

end of August to prepare for the 2024–2025 season. While not completely set, the concerts will again probably be in October, January, and April. Details of the season will be announced in later editions of the newsletter.

Presenting Two Nominations for Honorary Membership in FMMC

Two Honorary Memberships in FMMC will be formally presented at the Annual Meeting and Luncheon on May 3rd. The names of the musicians to be honored, along with letters of support, were presented to the Board of Governors in February and were unanimously approved.

The first honoree is **Grace Mc-Farlane-Bottelier**, longtime member of FMMC and well-known pianist and teacher, who currently serves as Director of the FMMC Foundation, a position she has held since 2020. She is praised for her expertise and dedication to the aims of the Foundation and to the continued success and prestige of the Washington International Competitions.

In addition to FMMC, she is President of the Washington Music Teachers Association, has served as Director of the Eastern Division of the Music Teachers National Association, and chaired the MTNA Local Association Grants Committee and MTNA Forum on Arts Awareness and Advocacy. As performer, she made her New York debut in 1982 in Carnegie Hall as a member of the Trio dell'Arte. She has performed as soloist and chamber artist in the US, and Canada, Mexico, Argentina, China (where she accompanied her husband on a 5-year assignment and performed extensively and conducted master classes). She has taught at the University of Maryland, Peabody Preparatory, Wheaton College, Judson College, and Levine School. She currently maintains an active teaching schedule in her home studio. In October 2023 she was inducted into the Steinway & Sons Teacher Hall of Fame.

Letters of support for this nomination came from Junko Takahashi, Chen-Li Tseng, and Simon Finlow, whose letter of support included the following, "I have worked closely with Grace on the Foundation Board of Trustees...and have been constantly impressed by her absolute devotion to the work and goals of the Foundation. She has faced the enormous demands of serving as Director with equally enormous strength and enthusiasm."

The second musician to be honored is **Peter Russell**, well known in the vocal world, who has served as artistic and administrative director of Vocal Arts DC since 2012. He previously served in executive roles as General Director of Opera Colorado in Denver, as Director of the Metropolitan Opera's Lindemann Young Artist Development Program, and as General Director of WolfTrap Opera Company in Virginia. A co-founder of Washington Concert Opera, he is also a frequent guest lecturer on opera, including for the Smithsonian Institution's Resident Associates Program and for Georgetown University's Continuing Education Series, and has frequently adjudicated vocal competitions, including the Metropolitan Opera Laffont Competition, the Richard Tucker Music Foundation, Partners in the Arts, and the Washington International Competition for Voice. He graduated *magna cum laude* with a B.A. in Music History from Yale University.

Letters of support came from Leslie Luxemburg, Yvonne Sabine, and Denyce Graves. The letter from Denyce Graves included..."I'm certain I am one of many who have benefited from Peter's interest, guidance, friendship. His legacy is secure, and he has been an Arts Administrator *par excellence*. He's built programs, planned seasons, managed people, chosen repertory, written program notes, completed professional research in the service of this beautiful, fantastic, wonderful art: this high-art called Opera...With my whole heart, I support and recommend the proposal of Peter Russell."

From the Foundation Director

till trying to find the words to express my feelings in my final newsletter column as Foundation Director. Reflecting on these last four years I am flooded with many memories. I had no idea when I joined FMMC as a performing member over 30 years ago how important a role this organization would play in my life. I valued the opportunity to perform in the weekly concerts. Not until I served on the Foundation Board of Trustees, first as co-chair of the WIC 2020/21 Piano competition, then as Director of the Foundation did I come to appreciate the special bonds of friendship, collaboration, and collegiality fostered amongst fellow club and board members. There have been challenges, including navigating the complexities of the covid pandemic, but they have been outweighed by the joys of sharing wonderful musical experiences and supporting and promoting talented young artists.

The Foundation's primary focus has been to organize and manage the two international competitions - the Washington International Competition and the Johansen International Competition for Young String Players. I found joy and satisfaction as we successfully navigated the process from the planning stages through the preliminary, semifinal, and final stages of each competition - 2020/2021 Virtual WIC Piano Competition, 2022 WIC Strings and Composition, 2022 JIC, 2023 WIC Voice, and currently, 2024 WIC Piano. Coordinating recitals, masterclasses, and welcoming back winners of our competitions for area performances and liaising with host families was always a delight.

This year's sixteen WIC Piano semifinalists have been selected and all have accepted the invitation to travel to DC for this year's competition. Special thanks to the five preliminary judges – Frank Conlon, Slava Gryaznov, Elissa Miller-Kay, Anna Ouspenskaya and Ryo Yamagitani – who offered their time, expertise, and professional assessment of the wide range of international applications from 135 contestants, and who expressed their amazement at the outstanding level of performance from these young artists.

We look forward to welcoming to DC our three internationally-acclaimed jurors – Olga Kern, John O'Conor, and Santiago Rodriguez –for the semifinals at George Washington University on May 25th. From the sixteen semifinalists, the jurors will select six finalists to compete in the Terrace Theater of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts on Sunday, May 26. Audience members will also be able to vote for their favorite performer.

A unique feature of the WIC competitions is the opportunity all semifinalists are afforded to receive personal, professional feedback from each of our three distinguished judges at the conclusion of the semifinal round. Several past contestants have expressed their appreciation for this time with the judges, getting personal advice that is especially relevant at the start of their developing careers.

The 2024 Competition Chair, Simon Finlow and Assistant Chair, Yuri Chayama, have done a superlative job running this competition, and we hope you will plan to attend. You will enjoy some amazing performances!
