FMMC Board Spotlights

ver the summer, FMMC's Board of Governors took a breath, then jumped into planning for the 2025-2026 season. Here are previews of what to expect in the broad FMMC calendar this season:

Chamber Concerts: Program Director Yooni Lee expects the programs will be similar to what was scheduled last season. In addition, she expects that Dumbarton Oaks and Strathmore will reopen in the spring and that three concerts will be held at the MLK Library. She expects to also collaborate with the Washington Performing Arts in a new Concerts in Schools program.

Auditions: Chair Marta Howard finds that virtual auditions work well for musicians and judges. Dates for auditions are posted on www.fmmc.org. She hopes to expand the pool of accompanists and judges from the broader FMMC membership.

Avanti: Manager Cherie Davis, Conductor Chi-Yuan Lin, and Orchestra Liaison Carol Bartholomew met to plan the orchestra's programs, as well as rehearsal and performance venues. Four concerts are in the works for the season. Updates will be sent to orchestra members with the repertoire and dates for rehearsals and performances.

Arioso: The chorale's first program in the fall will feature *Stabat Mater* by Rheinberger and four Mendelssohn works for chorus and orchestra. Manager Peter Baum announced that music has been ordered and will be available at the first rehearsal at Reformation Lutheran Church on Capitol Hill. The season's rehearsal and performance dates are posted on the Google Calendar attached to Arioso@finmc.org.

Outreach: Director Elizabeth Whitman has circulated performance dates and venues for the fall season. The process for signing up by all members for the confirmed sites has been streamlined and available at www.fmmc.org.

Finances: Director Anne Zim and her team have prepared a projected budget for the 2025–2026 season. Because of the many unknowns in the future, the budget is expected to have lower income and increased expenses. More information will be available by November. •

year and a few months ago, Grace McFarlane reached out to ask if I would consider being the chair for the FMMC Foundation's Washington International Competition for Strings in May of 2025. While I said yes without being sure exactly what I was getting into, I certainly had no idea that it would lead to me stepping into her shoes as Foundation Director after the competition was over! As I suspect is true for many FMMC members, I had only a pretty vague idea of exactly what the Foundation is and how it operates – I will write about that more in future newsletters – but the very valuable thing that I learned by first getting my feet wet as competition chair is that the Foundation is, above all, a team. It's a team that I am extremely grateful to have supporting me as I take on this new and somewhat daunting role.

It is very much thanks to that team that I can report a successful 2025 Washington International Competition. We received applications from 161 string players, ages 18-30, 28 of whom competed as semi-finalists on May 23 & 24 at George Washington University. The finals were held at the Terrace Theater of the Kennedy Center on May 25, and the first prize winners selected by the jury were Coco Mi, violin (USA), Yizilin Liang, viola (China) and Saebom Lee, cello (S. Korea). Second prize went to violist Ayano Nakamura (USA), third to violinist Daniel Rafimayeri (USA) and fourth prize to cellist Brandon Leonard (USA). Daniel Rafimayeri also won the Audience Prize, where attendees vote for their favorite performer. The esteemed artists that made up the jury were Tai Murray (violin), Yura Lee (violin & viola) and Matthew Zalkind (cello). It was an extra pleasure to welcome back Matthew, who was a first prize winner in the 2012 competition!

Concurrent with the string competition was the WIC for Composers, ably organized by Mark Simon. Judges Kevin Puts, Christopher Theofanidis and Michael Torke selected two prizewinners from among the 83 submissions: Bernard Walasavage's Hallow won first place and Einsteins by Maxim Dybal-Denysenko was second. Both pieces were performed by the Sunrise Quartet at the string competition finals while jury deliberations took place. Especially gratifying was that the quartet enjoyed the winning composition so much that they have chosen to include it on their program for an upcoming performance at Meadowlark Gardens in Vienna, VA. It will be at 3 pm on Sunday, Sept. 14 – come out and hear it!

It would take more space than I have to list the many contributions of various FMMC members that made all of the above happen. Dozens of individuals volunteered their time to help in different ways. I must name just a few, though: Yuri Chayama, Simon Finlow, Eunju Kwak, Lois Smith Jones, and Katie Katinas deserve special thanks for their dedication and care in making sure everything came together.

And finally, I must give heartfelt thanks to Grace McFarlane, not only for being instrumental to the success of this year's competition, but for six years of being a steady, gracious, kind, and skillful hand at the head of the Foundation. Her enormous commitment, generosity, and hospitality make her both an excellent example and a difficult act to follow. Thank you, Grace, for all that you have done for the Foundation.



Outreach

The Outreach Program presented 70 concerts last season, and we are hoping to provide even more concerts this year. However, to do this, we need volunteers.

This fall, we have performances scheduled at Arlington Central Library Memory Cafe, Bender JCC of Greater Washington in Rockville, Brighton Gardens of Friendship Heights, Friends Club of Bethesda, Homecrest House in Silver Spring, Providence of Fairfax, Sunrise Senior Living on Connecticut Avenue in DC, and Walter Reed Community Center Memory Cafe in Arlington.

Any FMMC member may perform for the Outreach Program— no audition is required. At least one performer must be an FMMC member, but FMMC members may collaborate with nonmembers to form a program. Volunteer musicians are asked to prepare a program consisting of a minimum of 30-45 minutes of music, along with a brief discussion of the pieces they will be performing (total of 40-60 minutes). We also encourage musicians to perform their programs at multiple venues so more audiences can enjoy their music!

Highlights from the FMMC 2025 Spring Luncheon

PMMC member Nancy Peery Marriott is a Solo Soprano, Associate Composer, and Honorary Member. She has been a generous FMMC donor through the Marriott Foundation for years and doubled her donation in the 2024 season. To honor her support, President Albert Hunt asked her to present the keynote speech at the FMMC 2025 Spring Luncheon. Excerpts from her inspiring speech follow.

"I am excited to be here with you and to share a bit of my musical "life story."

We share a love of and appreciation for the arts and music. The arts inspire, challenge, entertain, enrich, and comfort us. Music allows us to celebrate and preserve our cultural heritage. It also challenges us to explore realms of expression, imagination, and creation that enable us to grow personally along with our musical abilities.

For me, the focus is on the process: through each role, rehearsal, class, and performance, I become more confident and more skilled. Enormous discipline and commitment, both emotionally and physically, are required to be accomplished and competent in our field.

There is no "finish line," no "I have reached my level." Every interaction with others and music offers insight into who we are and what we can accomplish. We can say "I did my best today," knowing that tomorrow we will have another opportunity to do better.

I was fortunate to grow up in a family that appreciated the arts. My grandfather played the piano, my father played the drums, my mother played the piano and was a trained dancer, and her siblings played a variety of instruments. There was always music and dance in our homes, and I loved it.

When I was in 5th grade, I told my parents that I would like to take singing lessons (because a friend was) and they enthusiastically found a good teacher. The same year, I competed in my first vocal competition in Palo Alto, CA. I won, and the reward was to sing "Come to the Fair" on the radio. I was hooked!! I was a performing musician!

I continued my musical studies throughout high school, and was exposed by coaches to a variety of music, even Italian art songs, in year-end recitals. I performed in school choir concerts and plays, in church musicals and roadshows, as a quartet and a band, and even for my mother's lunch groups.

At the University of Utah, I had the rare privilege of studying with Dr. Richard Condie, Director of the Morman Tabernacle Choir. He invited me to join the Choir, but I reluctantly declined at that time. I continued to perform throughout college and was exposed to many singing styles and composers as well as English classics.

The second time I auditioned for the University's summer traveling company to perform "Annie Get Your Gun" in South America, I made the cast. I was dating a boy at the time and realized that our romance would not weather the separation. I chose him, Dick Marriott, and 64 years later we are still in love. "Nancy Got Her Man!"

Dick choose to pursue his MBA at Harvard Business School, so we moved to Boston where I could substitute teach and continue my music. My teacher, Janet Irving, even allowed me to bring our first child, Julie, to my music lessons. Mrs. Irving was a dynamic teacher and continued her classes until she was 100 years old. What a commitment!

After Dick's graduation, we moved to Maryland and had three more daughters. Through referrals I had a chance to join the Friday Morning Music Club, and was introduced to so many wonderful musicians, not just sopranos!

While our girls were growing up, Dick and I encouraged them in musical studies. We often performed together in church, civic events, at nursing homes or wherever the "Marriott girls" were invited. It was a challenge to keep moving forward with my vocal studies, but the effort was well worth it.

Once the girls left home, I took every opportunity to grow and develop my gifts: taking classes at the University of Maryland, attending the Alaska Summer Arts Festival for more than 20 years, and taking master classes with Renee Fleming and Malena Malas. Internationally, I studied opera with the American Institute of Musical Studies in Graz, Austria; the Amalfi Coast Festival in Italy; and the University of Miami Frost School of Music in Salzburg, Austria.

I have enjoyed being an FMMC member all these years and appreciate the growth and performance opportunities it has offered. Through a referral from Bob McCoy, who passed away suddenly, I became a student of David Chapman and still work twice a week with David to improve my performances and repertoire accompanied by him or Frank Conlon.

Practice is critical. I have the luxury of being able to practice almost anywhere—in the shower, the car, the kitchen, the garden, on a plane—I need nothing but my voice. Yet practice is critical for success and a musician must be committed to its necessity.

Performers have to prepare themselves for the performance, not simply practice the pieces. Have we made a video or audio of the practice sessions to see how we project and enhance our delivery? Have we practiced in front of mirrors or friends to receive feedback? Have we considered what to wear or how to use makeup to set the stage and give insights to the audience of the mood we are creating? If we are just showing up, the audience will know and respond accordingly.

Every time we take the stage, we are presenting our best selves (at that moment) and offering a glimpse into a world of magic and wonder through our

Upcoming Concerts

Arioso: Chorale Rehearsals Start on September 7

As Arioso was taking the summer off and getting ready for our 12th season under Paul Leavitt's direction, it was an interesting search to find choral works that (a) weren't those commonly chosen by groups to sing and (b) allowed us to make full use of our supporting orchestra. We believe that the program chosen for our first concert of the season meets these criteria.

Arioso will begin its preparations for the first of three concerts on September 7. The fall concerts will be held on Thursday, October 30 (8:00 PM and Sunday, November 2 (4:00 PM). The program for this first concert will include Josef Rheinberger's *Stabat Mater* (Op. 138) and three *Psalms* (42, 95, and 114) set by Felix Mendelssohn, as well as his *Verleih uns Frieden*. Rehearsals and the concert performances will be at the Lutheran Church of the Reformation (212 E. Capitol St, NE). For those interested in playing in the orchestra, rehearsals will begin on September 8. For further information, please contact Peter Baum at chorale@fmmc.org.

The programs for the second and third concerts in this year's season have not
